BROSS CONSTRUCTION INTIMATE LAWSUIT

Writes Clerk Bailey Letter Contending They Were Lowest

ALLEGED AWARD WAS OUTSIDE MERTI

Attorneys For Bidders Receive Reply From County Clerk Bailey

The Bross Construction Co., of Portland, are in the limelight, contending that their company was the lowest bidder, according to plans and specifications, for the construction of the new court house annex. The work was awarded to William Foster, whose figures on the face were higher than the Bross Construction. Clerk Bailey, says, however, that the bid of the Bross Construction, when their attention was called to the steel specifications, raised their bid over \$1,400, while Foster in his bid holds to the steel construction as asked.

The court, through the county clerk, asked for bids, and as a matter of fact, any or all bids could have been rejected; or any part of the bid could have been turned down. Just how there is any case against the county is not plain to be seen, under the circumstances. Mr. Bailey answered the letter of the attorneys, and enclosed them the original advertisement, showing that the court reserved the right to reject any or all bids, or any portion thereof.

The proposal for bids read, at the close, as follows:

"The Board of County Commissioners reserve the right to reject any or all proposals or any portion of any proposal submitted."

MRS. GRANT ZUMWALT

Mrs. Nellie Petty Zumwalt, wife of Grant Zumwalt, died at the Good Samaritan Hospital, Portland, May 1, 1912, after a three weeks illness, and a surgical operation. Mrs. Zumwalt was the daughter of N. C. Petty and Clara M. Petty, and was born at Pilot Mound, Iowa, April 9, 1891. She was married to Grant Zumwalt at Tillamook, February 23, 1912. Mrs. Zumwalt was a member of the M. E. Church, a class leader in the Sunday School, was a graduate of the Pilot Mound, Ia., High School, and taught until her health caused her to leave the school room. She was a woman of rare character, helpful and thoughtful, being always solicitous of the welfare of those in touch with her daily life. Her many acts of charity were modestly bestowed, and she was universally beloved and esteemed by a large circle of friends. Her father, two brothers and a sister have passed away, and she is survived only by her husband, Grant Zumwalt, of Hillsboro, and her mother, Mrs. Clara Copeland, of this city.

The funeral took place Saturday, May 4, services being held in the M. E. Church, Rev. Weber conducting the obsequies. Interment was in the Odd Fellows Cemetery.

The husband and mother have the sympathy of their friends here and in Tillamook County.

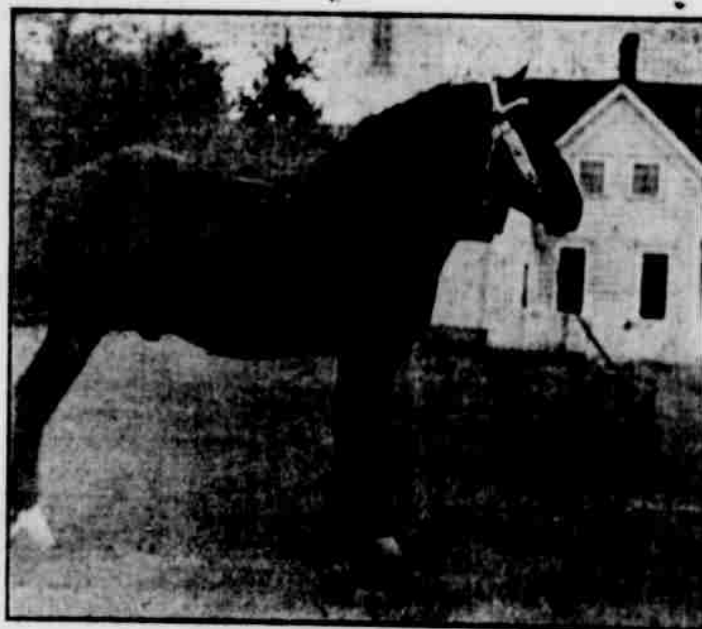
