

SHERIFF'S OFFICE MAKES BIG TURN-OVER

Have Collected \$401,801.87 in Taxes up to Last Night

180 MONTHS AHEAD OF 1911

Expeditious Work Done on the Collection Ledger and Computation

The Sheriff's office has made a record-breaking run on both collections and turning over of cash to the county treasurer in this year of our Lord 1912. Up to last night the total collections on the 1911 taxroll have been a total of \$401,801.87, and by last night the entire collection has been segregated into the various funds and turned over to Treasurer F. B. Sappington.

Last year the turnover was completed on July 27. A. W. Siegert has been in charge of the collection ledger this season, and he was assisted by Chas. Lamkin. Mr. Hancock pays Siegert the compliment of being the most rapid of any man making it a business to work on the segregation of the funds and the expeditious with which he has accomplished the requisitions proves the praise.

It is figured that the cost of collection considering the amount involved, has been cheaper than in the majority of counties in the state. The number of receipts written this year so far is 7,332, while last year at turnover completion the number totalled 6,569.

SCHOOL BOND ELECTION OF MUCH IMPORTANCE

City and District Must Have More School Room at Once

BIG VOTE IS EXPECTED TUESDAY

Proposition is for a Thirty-Five Thousand and Dollar Structure

Next Tuesday afternoon there will be an election of great importance to Hillsboro's school district, for there is no possible doubt of the necessity for a new school building. The present building is not of sufficient capacity, being already over-crowded. The proposal for a new building has twice been voted down, because of various dissensions as to location of site, etc. It is now time to drop the matter of location, and do what should be done—vote to build a decent structure for school purposes.

The vote will be bonds "Yes," or bonds "No," and the polls will be open at the public school building, next Tuesday afternoon, May 14, from 1:00 to 4:00. As a matter of information the following have a right to vote at this election: "Any person over 21 years of age, male or female, who has property on the last year's taxroll, or owns any stock in any company that is assessed on the roll."

This means that women who have property on the roll can vote equally as well as a man who has property properly assessed.

The old county jail building, of late years used as a woodshed for the county, is now razed, to prepare the foundation for the new annex. The old jail sheltered a number of noted criminals in its day, and one man, X. N. Steeves, the celebrated Portland criminal lawyer, who was tried for the murder of Geo. Sayres, slept under its roof, as did also the notorious "Bunco" Kelly, convicted of the same charge. Kelly served several years and was paroled, while Steeves was acquitted and went to the Orient.

LOOKS LIKE SEPARATE FRANCHISES BY COUNCIL

Engineer Stannard and Fred Waters Before Authorities, Tuesday

STANNARD SAYS 90 DAYS FOR WATER

Paving Question Still up in the Air—Council Meets Tonight

The council met Tuesday night and representatives of the Washington-Oregon Corporation, Engineer J. L. Stannard and Fred Waters, were present to confer with the city fathers. Both reviewed the water question, and explained thoroughly why it was necessary to separate the water franchise from the dual one now covering both water and light. Mr. Stannard said that just as soon as the water franchise was granted his company would start to promote the gravity system, and that pure mountain water would be running into the county seat within 90 days. The council meets tonight to again take up the matter, and it would on the surface appear that the separate franchise has a favorable following.

The matter of paving on Second and Washington Streets is still in statu quo. Tarvia has been recommended, but it is understood that there is now some opposition on the part of those who formerly held for a cheaper pavement than bitulithic.

It is stated that there will be several bidders for the Tarvia paving when bids are called, however, and Tuesday night was the last call for objections to the proposed pave.

The council tonight will discuss both paving and the water franchise and the objections to the details of the water franchise will be threshed out.
