IRVING HIGGINBOTHAM TO PITCH FOR BEAVERS

Former Hillsborite Sold by Toledo This Week to McCredie

ONCE PITCHED FOR CHICAGO CUBS

Also Won Pennant for Aberdeen in Northwest League

Irving Higginbotham, a former Hillsborite, and who has pitched on the Hillsboro diamond in years passed, when he was a youngster, will report to the coast at once and join the McCredie pitching staff. He has pitched for the Chicago cubs, and won his game, and last year was with the Louisville team, in the Southern League. This year he has been with the Toledo team, but that aggregation having a full complement, he was sold to the coast Portland team. Higginbotham has a good curve, and is one of the best batting pitchers in American baseball. He pitched for Aberdeen a few years ago, and after winning them a pennant went to St. Louis. Later he was sold to Chicago, but although he won his games, was not in the class with the oldtimers. Since then he has improved wonderfully, and he has cost McCredie a pretty sum of money.

Higginbotham is always in the game, and when he comes back to Portland there will be many from Oregon City, Hillsboro, Rainier and St. Helens who will go in to see the youngster heave them over the plate for the Beavers. Since leaving Hillsboro, the young pitcher has married and settled down. His chief fault is said to be in fighting the team manager, always wanting to play. He would like to play every game - but managers do not take kindly to that program.

VICTORY FOR BITULITHIC

Action of Newberg in selecting this material for hard surfacing her streets, is likewise regarded as a victory for property owners.

Newberg, Ore., May 10, 1912. The contract for paving the streets of Newberg was awarded by the city council last night, bitulithic being the material selected. The decision of the council was practically unanimous as to the material to be used, as the mayor and council, as well as the committee representing the property owners, have had the matter under consideration for some time, and have thoroughly investigated the claims made by the various paving companies as to the different materials proposed.

Though paving propositions, slightly cheaper as the initial expense, were submitted, it was considered practical to select the more durable bitulithic, owing to the great saving made possible in maintenance, as this material lasts for years without the necessity for repairs.

General satisfaction is felt regarding the action of the council in the selection of paving material and a natural result of the unanimous action of the property owners in signing the petitions that have been circulated in favor of bitulithic, and the work of paving, which will begin at once, is said to be but a fore-runner of much improvement which will take place here this spring.
