COUNCIL HAS SESSION OF MUCH IMPORTANCE

Passed Ordinances to Pave Second and Washington Streets

MOTION CARRIED TO IMPROVE THIRD

Water and Light Franchises are Segregated at Meeting

The city council held an important session at the city hall Tuesday evening, and improvement will be the order of the day from now on. Ordinances were passed declaring paving of the Tarvia specifications on Second Street, from Baseline to the Southern Pacific depot, and on Washington from Second to the Pacific Railway & Navigation track. A motion was also passed favoring a resolution to pave Third from Washington to the S. P. track with gravel bitulithic. Seventy-five per cent. of the property owners can change the kind of paving. A motion to pave Third from Lincoln one block north was offered, but was withdrawn upon the statement from A. C. Shute that he represented a number of property owners, and that they would soon present a petition calling for street improvement. A motion to pave North Range from Main to Fir with bitulithic was offered but was withdrawn upon representation by T. H. Tongue Jr. that he represented several big property owners along the route, and he requested that he would like a hearing for his clients before the motion was acted upon.

Upon petition of a majority of property owners on Washington, between Third and Sixth, a motion was carried calling for a resolution to improve to be passed on at the next meeting of the council. The petitions ask for gravel bitulithic.

A petition was presented asking that the Mayor and council ask City Engineer Kelsay to have the field reports, surveys, etc., of the city, on file with the city recorder. Mayor Bagley advised Dr. Tamesie, who was present in behalf of the petitioners that the city had all data due the city from the engineer.

Water Franchise Separated

The Washington-Oregon Corporation was given separate franchises for their water and light systems, in order to permit the company to instal a gravity system. The new franchise saves the city from paying for new hydrants needed and ordered, and the rental for hydrants, which must be of double pattern, will be \$1 monthly for each. This charge will cost the city about \$3,000 for five years, after which there will be no charge. This saves the city \$600 on immediate installation. The ordinance cuts down the charge of arc lights, saving \$1500 in the five years; and the patrons are to get 3,000 gallons of water for a monthly charge of \$1 instead of 2,000 gallons, as under the old franchise. The city under the old right, was required to pay 6 per cent. annually on cost of extensions, until the private income equalled that much, and this, too, has been eliminated. The street light rates saves \$25 per month, or \$300 per year, and must run to one a. m. instead of twelve. Whether the company will accept or not remains to be seen, but it most likely will file acceptance and put up a \$50,000 indemnity bond to insure installation of the gravity system. If they do, Engineer Stannard says, "mountain water in 90 days."

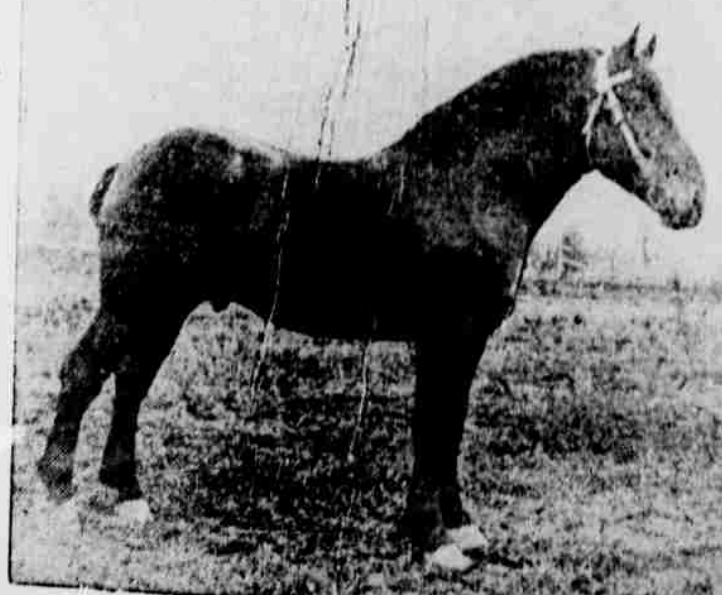

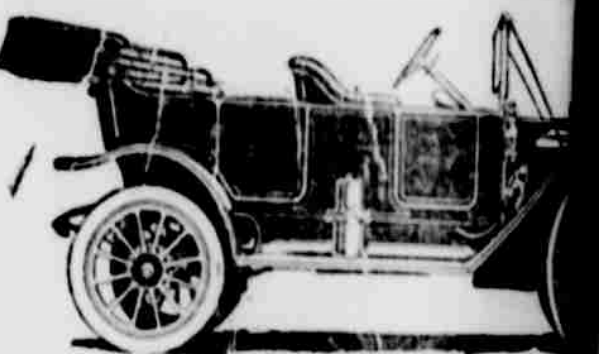
