Today a reverent nation does homage to the soldier dead of the greatest republic in the world. Every community, urban or suburban, suspends business to do honor to those who have passed to the great beyond. It is tribute due and recognized, and affords a lesson in patriotism that is lasting in its effects upon a nation. Roosevelt carried the New Jersey primaries over President Taft, Tuesday, getting every delegate in the state. The only fly in the Roosevelt ointment is whether Mr. Taft's weakness means a primary strength for Roosevelt that can not and will not obtain at the presidential election. Strenuous times are ahead for that Chicago convention and for a day or so it looks as though Kilkenny will be the Emerald Isle.
