**SECOND SPRAYING FOR THE CODLING MOTH**

If You Want Good Fruit Follow These Articles From a Grower

**BARNEY LEIS TELLS HOW HE SPRAYS**

Advises Growers to Get Busy and Take an Interest

B. Leis, the Beaverton apple grower, in response to a request for an article on the second spraying for Codling moth, writes the Argus as follows:

"The time for the second spraying for Codling moth, or worms, will be with us in a few days, and to redeem my promise to you to send an article, I will give an outline of how I manage my orchard, so that others may profit. I have written or said nothing that I have not successfully practiced on my own trees so that those who are following my method may rest assured that they will get best results, and they all say: 'Leis, I never raised better apples, and can sell all I raise at top figures.' And why not? I have done this for years, and have in my possession first premium medals and diplomas galore, competing with apple raising sections that claim to grow the best apples in the world.

Let me say right here that Washington county has shown them that we can beat all comers with proper care, but I am sorry to state that there is not a great deal of interest taken in the apple business here. If we would take only half as much interest as they do in Hood River or other districts we could and would beat the world, and then some. This is not an idle boast, and I mean every word of it.

**THE TIME FOR SPRAYING**

About the 20th of June will be the proper time for the second spraying for the Codling moth, will have deposited their eggs and they hatch in about 7 or 8 days. They usually lay their eggs on the leaves. The time may vary some, depending on the weather. If the nights are warm we may look for them sooner, or vice versa, but it is safe to spray as near that time as possible, as they do not take the worm long to get to the calyx cup of the apple, and as you know, the most of the first brood enter by the calyx. Now if you sprayed after the blossom fell your apple is protected, the cup being full of poison, killing the pest with their first meal. The object now, with this second spraying, is to cover the apple with the poison, so that should any try to enter by the side the result would be death. For this spraying I use from 25 to 30 pounds of arsenate of lead to 50 gallons of water, adding one gallon of lime and sulphur solution. But let me insist on your getting the best neutral arsenate of lead. There are many different brands of neutral arsenates on the market and at various prices. The best is one that arsenate of lead should be of a certain per cent of water soluble arsenic and moisture. Now, some years ago I sprayed three times for worms, with different brands of arsenate of lead, and I am ashamed to admit I had not sprayed at all, and the remark was made—'What is the use of spraying—Leis sprayed three times and I did not spray at all, and he had as many worms as I did.' So you will see how important it is to get a good quality of arsenate of lead. Of five samples bought in the open market by the experiment station at Corvallis, and analyzed, four samples fell short and only one—the Grasselli—came up to the legal requirement. Grasselli is the standard, adopted by Hood River growers' union, Rogue River, Yakima horticultural union, and others. They want and get the best. They are in the apple growing business, and they would not use Grasselli to save a few cents.

Use the best and you will not sacrifice your crop and perhaps lose many dollars. Use the best and get results. You can not expect best results and use poor arsenate.

I have noticed that the aphid is more troublesome this year than for many seasons, particularly on the young trees. Those having young orchards should take action before it is too late, as they sap the vitality from the young trees. The leaves will curl and drop later, and the defoliation of the tree and stunt them out of a season's growth. For this I have used different remedies, but find the sulphate of nicotine, or Black Leaf 40 the best, and it will get the young trees in growing condition again. I guarantee it will kill the green, brown and woolly aphid. To 60 gallons of water use one gallon of black leaf.

Don't forget to spray your chicken house with lime and sulphur solution. Use 10 gallons of water to one of solution. It is superior to any lice killer on the market, and much cheaper. The birds will not hatch where it has been used. I have been requested by those using it to let the Argus readers know of this."
