SCHOOL BONDS SELL WITHOUT TROUBLE

Merchant Savings & Trust Co. Take the Thirty-Five Thousand BONDS SELL AT \$359 PREMIUM

Deeds Are Now in Escrow at Price of \$5,000 For Six

Hillsboro's school bonds have been sold in the sum of \$35,000, and the Merchant's Savings & Trust Co., of Portland, are the buyers. The price paid for the bonds was par and premium of \$359, together with accrued interest. The paper will carry five per cent. interest, are of 20 year tenure, and any or all are redeemable after a period of ten years.

The deeds for the selected school site have been signed by the Connell heirs, and are in escrow at one of the Hillsboro banks, and will be turned over upon payment by the district of \$5,000. This is considered a cheap enough piece of property, and if the district could have done any better the patrons are from Missouri, and would like to have it pointed out.

Bids will soon be asked for the construction of the school buildings, and by early Fall another good structure will have graced the townsite of Hillsboro.
