**THOMAS B. PERKINS,**  
**MERCHANT, PASSES**

Taken by Bright's Disease, Last Friday Morning, at 9:30

MANY YEARS A COUNTY MERCHANT

Started Career Here, at Cedar Mill, Many Years Ago—a Kentuckian

Thomas B. Perkins, a well-known merchant, died at his home on Baseline Street, Friday morning, July 12, 1912, at 9:30 o'clock, death ensuing from Bright's disease, with complications. Mr. Perkins was born in Albany, Kentucky, June 10, 1852. He was wedded to Miss Amanda Jane Francis, at his birth-place, May 1, 1872. Ten years later, 1882, they came to Portland, Oregon, and Mr. Perkins first took a position with the Meier &



Frank Co. Later he moved to Cedar Mill, where he conducted a general store. The family moved to Hillsboro in 1889, and Mr. Perkins engaged in the mercantile business, afterward incorporating with Hughes, Morgan & Rogers. After quitting business here he moved to Portland, residing in the suburbs. When the P. R. & N. built through Buxton, he conducted a general merchandise store at that point for several years. Last Summer he moved back to Hillsboro and opened a general store on Second Street, in the J. C. Greear building, next door to the telephone central.

Mr. Perkins had a wide circle of friends in Washington County, and was widely known as a man of integrity in his dealings. The funeral took place, Sunday, from the Christian Church, and interment was in the Masonic cemetery, he having for years been a member of that order.

Mrs. Perkins and the following children survive: Dr. T. L. Perkins, a popular dentist of Portland, a nominee on the republican ticket for state senator; Mrs. M. L. Berdan, Hillsboro; John William, of Los Angeles, now in Hillsboro; E. L. Perkins, Hillsboro, holding the office of county recorder of conveyances; Benjamin R., of Eugene; James B., with the United States Marine Corps, Mare Island, now in the city on a furlough. A daughter, Mrs. John H. Humphreys, died several years ago.
