

BROSS CONSTRUCTION CO. GET THE AWARD

Will Assemble Material and Start Building School House at Once
ELEVEN HUNDRED BELOW ESTIMATE
Next Lowest Bidder Was William Foster, New Building Court House

Eleven bidders turned in figures to the school district board, Monday, at noon, and directors A. C. Shute, Dr. Tamiesie and Mayor H. T. Bagley, after a consultation, awarded the contract to the Bross Construction Company, of Portland, for the sum of \$26,400, which was \$1,100 under the estimate of Architect Newton C. Gaunt. Wm. Foster was the next highest bidder, and was but \$150 higher than the successful bid. The Bross people will assemble their material and at once start work on the structure. The district will now have \$3,600 with which to pay the architect's commission and furnish the building.
