A. B. He has planted in the neighborhood of 20,000 celery plants, getting 18,000 from Morton. He thinks he has the soil and as he is a hustler he will try to do the rest. If successful it will mean a little mint. He is also putting out several thousand cabbage plants—and he knows what they will do. While the lowlands of and near Beaverton have grown celery it has never been tried out to any extent in this immediate neighborhood.

There is still a great deal of talk about boring the big tunnel through Portland mountain, for the purpose of rapid transit and a roadway through to the Tualatin basin. If the big hole is ever driven it will mean exactly 30 minutes from Portland to Hillsboro—and that will mean suburban property all the way between the two county seats. If the tunnel is ever driven there will be a carline, and two wagon roadways, with occasional turn-outs, for the convenience of travel. A roadway on each side of the car line is the contemplated construction, and it begins to look as though Portland capital will finance the project. As the Rose City will double in ten years, making a mart of a half-million, people with money should realize what it will mean for every acre of real estate between the two points.
