NOTICE OF STREET IMPROVEMENT.
Notice is hereby given that the City Council of Hillsboro, Washington County, Ore., did, on July 24, 1912, pass an ordinance regulating the extension to improvements Main street from the west line of First street to the east line of North Range street, all in the City of Hillsboro, Or., in the following manner, to wit: By bringing the surface of the same to the proper grade, paving the roadway with Rocklote pavement, laying and constructing Rocklote borders, constructing concrete curb, combination concrete curb and gutter and granite curbs, and removing and replacing certain stones at intervals, so that the character of the improvement work done will make a proportionate improvement.

State improvements to be made in accordance with the charter and ordinances of the City of Hillsboro, Or., for the owners of 75 percent of the property to be affected by this improvement, and upon which assessments have been placed, shall be paid by the property owner, in said city, for the cost of the same, to be paid by the City Council before the adoption of an ordinance declaring the same agree upon a different kind of improvement, the estimates of the cost thereof, and the specifications of the same, shall be made upon the basis of the character of the property, and the cost of the same to be affected by the City Council, and the City Council reserves the right to designate a different kind of pavement if the property owners shall so direct, as above specified.
