COUNTY SCHOOLS GET FOURTEEN THOUSAND

State Sends Washington County \$1.86 for Each of School Age

STANDS SIXTH IN THE STATE LIST

Fund Comes From Interest on Loans by State Land Board

Washington County is sixth in the state on the number of children of school age, between the ages of four and twenty, as evidenced by the state census of school children, and apportionment of public funds for school purposes. This goes to show that this is a pretty good "Roosevelt" community, and that race suicide has not yet planted its microbe in the land of the Tualatin. Multnomah County leads, with Marion second, Lane third, Clackamas fourth, Linn fifth and Washington, sixth.

The money is apportioned every six months, and Washington receives the next little sum of \$14,217.84. The money comes from the interest received by the state land board for loans over the state, on six per cent. first mortgages.

Wheeler County is the baby, receiving but a little over \$1,100. Multnomah County gets \$82,626.78.

BEIMROHR SAWMILL BURNED YESTERDAY

Fire Caught at Two o'clock in Morning, Entailing Big Loss

BLAZE STARTED ON THE ROOF

Loss is Somewhere Between Ten and Fifteen Thousand

The Alex Beimrohr sawmill, situated on Gates Creek, a short distance above Gales City, burned yesterday morning, between two and four o'clock, the blaze catching in the roof, where a spark had evidently slumbered for several hours. When the blaze was discovered there was such a head-way that no amount of work of fire-fighting could have stopped its progress. The mill and machinery are a total loss and a great deal of lumber went up in smoke. The loss is variously estimated at from ten to fifteen thousand dollars.

Insurance was carried in the sum of four thousand dollars, placed in the London & Lancashire and the Orient, and written by John Vanderwal, of Hillsboro.

Mr. Beimrohr was just getting up on his feet, and the loss is keenly felt. Mr. Vanderwal went to the scene of the fire yesterday to adjust the claims. It is stated that Beimrohr will build as as to be ready for a run next season.
