National Progressives Will Meet
at K. P. Hall, Forest Grove

MULKEY AND JOSEPH TO SPEAK

"Bull Moose" Adherents Start Things
Rolling in Washington Co.

H. J. Goff, of Forest Grove, was in town Tuesday morning, and states that the National Progressive Party, in support of Roosevelt, will formally open its campaign Saturday evening, August 10, 1912, at the Pythian Hall in Forest Grove, when Hon. F. W. Mulkey, ex-United States Senator, and State Senator Geo. W. Joseph, both eloquent Rooseveltites, will deliver addresses. The meeting will elect a county central committee, a state committeeman, and transact such other business as shall be decided upon as in line with promoting the campaign, which, according to its supporters, is to be full of interest, wide-awake, and imbued with all the pepper in command of those who are against Taft and yet have been named as Republicans.

Washington County gave Roosevelt a plurality over Taft in the April primaries, and there was no organization whatever. It was a silent, powerful vote, and it came under the wire without heralding of trumpets. The progressives allege that with a good old-fashioned campaign, appealing to the justice of the republican voters, they should repeat the victory of last Spring without straining an axe or puncturing the campaign auto.

And, to be candid, from expressions heard here and there, it begins to look as though the county will cast more Roosevelt votes than Taft votes when November rolls around.

The committee in charge ask the Argus to extend a general invitation to all Republicans opposed to Taft to be present at the Forest Grove meeting.

CIRCUIT COURT

The Shaw-Fear Co. must deed the school house site in the Aloha district for \$600 according to the verdict of the jury, last Friday. The jury: Chas. Liebermann, Ira E. Purdin, F. B. Clark, Fred Meyers, J. F. Brandt, Pen Patton, Geo. Galbreath, J. A. Abbott, J. C. Corey, Gustave Grabhorn, Dan Baker. This is the case where suit was brought to condemn a site after months of contention. The school board has already selected another site, and Treasurer Sappington has advertised for the sale of bonds, Crane versus Crane, decree of divorce.

In the divorce suit of his wife against R. Schultz, of Forest Grove, the court made an order that suit money should be turned over to allow Mrs. Schultz to prosecute her case in court.

J. E. Burnett versus E. H. Betroche, decree for plaintiff.
