LITTLEHALES WINS HIS PAVING CONTEST

Forest Grove City Council Resolves to no Longer Fight Suit
PASSES RESOLUTION TO THAT EFFECT
 Important Case Brought to Close by Stipulation; City Pays Costs

The case of Littlehales versus the city of Forest Grove came to an end this week by virtue of a resolution passed by the city council, declaring that Second Avenue would not be paved with bitulithic, and that the attorneys for the city be instructed not to further press the fight against the appeal for an injunction. Attorneys for the plaintiff Monday started to get witnesses for their cause, when Geo. R. Bagley was unofficially notified that the city had passed such a resolution. He deferred until he was in touch with the attorneys for Forest Grove, and an agreement was made to then stipulate the case for dismissal so far as Forest Grove was concerned. The city agrees to pay all costs and disbursements, and Littlehales, of course, will be out of pocket the attorneys' charges only.

This is the celebrated case wherein a monopoly was charged, and as the Supreme Court has made a ruling that collection can not be made for work where a monopoly can be proven, the prosecution felt sure of their final winning of the case, and the dismissal came as a surprise because it was thought Forest Grove would fight the injunction to the bitter end.

It is reported on the streets here that the Warren people were instrumental in getting the council to drop the case as the company felt it would be handicapped in transacting business with its books away from their general offices.

A prominent Portland financier was passing through the city Sunday in an auto, and stopped for a few minutes. This was his first trip to Hillsboro, although he has been in Portland for 30 years. He said: "I have been in many Oregon cities of the size of Hillsboro, but never before in a city of your population have I seen three nicer banking houses. NOTICE OF STREET IMPROVEMENT

Notice is hereby given that the City Council of Hillsboro, Washington County, Ore., did, on July 22, 1912, pass a resolution declaring its intention to improve Main street from the west line of First street to the east line of North Main street, all in the City of Hillsboro, Ore., in the following manner, to-wit: By bringing the surface of the same to the proper sub-grade, paving the roadway with Rockolite pavement laying and constructing Rockolite borders, concrete curbs, concrete sidewalks and gutters and appurtenances, and concrete curbs, sidewalks, driveways, and by doing such other improvement work as will make a grade and appropriate improvement.

Said improvement to be made in accordance with the charter and ordinances of the City of Hillsboro, Ore., but if the owners of 15 per cent of the property to be affected by said improvement, and upon which assessments will be levied to pay for the same, shall, by petition presented to the City Council before the adoption of an ordinance declaring the same, agree upon a different kind of improvement, the petitioner reserves the right to designate a different kind of pavement if the property owners shall so direct, as above specified.

That written objections and amendments to such proposed improvement may be made and filed with the Recorder of said city at any time before 7 o'clock p. m. on August 6, 1912.
