COL. EDDY SAYS TWO WEEKS WILL INSTALL

Work Soon to Begin on the Hillsboro End of Electric Road
NEARLY FINISHED AT FOREST GROVE
Right of Way Man Was in the City Tuesday Morning, on Business

Col. J. E. Eddy, oldtime newspaper man, and now right-of-way agent for the Southern Pacific, was in the city Tuesday morning. He states that the Southern Pacific has nearly completed into Forest Grove, and connected from the heart of the city on to Dilley, and that as soon as the construction crew is through up there they will be moved to Hillsboro. He states that it will not take over two weeks to put in the Hillsboro extension, as the work will be very light.

When asked if he thought the line would be located prior to the street fair dates he said that he thought the company would have the track laid by that time, and the street all put back in shape. There will be less than a mile of track to lay, here, and the grading amounts to nothing. The heavy work will be cutting through the three blocks of bitulithic from Fourth to First Street, but a large crew will operate so as to rush things to completion. Mr. Eddy states that the depot room, leased from Dr. W. D. Wood, will be remodelled and repaired by the time the track is ready for operation of trains.

DR. V. E. EMMEL SCORES

Dr. V. E. Emmel a son of C. C. Emmel, of Scholls, in a series of microscopic researches, has established beyond doubt a question that has been unsettled for some time, and added to scientific wealth. He has corroborated the origin of the red corpuscle in the blood, and has a splendid paper in Science, a publication having a wide circulation among men interested in scientific research. Dr. Emmel is a graduate of Pacific University, Forest Grove, and from that school went to Brown University, graduating there in 1907. He attended Harvard in 1908 and then took a position with Washington University, St. Louis, Mo. In 1911 he was married to Miss Lewis, of the Oak Grove section, his wife also being a graduate of P. U. That year he and his wife went to Germany, on research work, returning to St. Louis in 1912, and he is now occupying a chair in the Washington Medical College.

His many Washington County friends congratulate him upon his work along scientific lines.

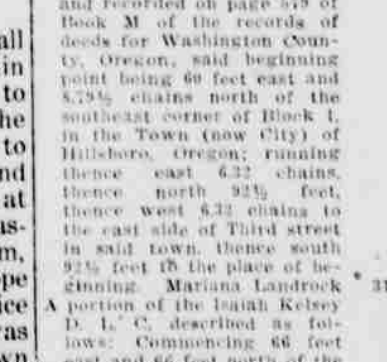
