Business men are coming up handsomely in support of the coming street fair. This is proper, and notwithstanding a bad Fall so far as weather conditions are concerned there is promise of a fine exhibit.

#### BAD WEATHER

Rains have interfered with hop picking the past week, but there appears as yet to be but little mold. If the damp weather should continue, however, look out for breakers. Two or three bright days is the total for the past week, and rains again set in last evening, after two days of clear weather.

Many big farms yet have grain in the shock, but the small farmers have mostly threshed, or have their grain in the stack. That the wet weather has meant thousands of dollars loss goes without saying, and all are hoping for a cessation of storm.

#### CHEAPER INSURANCE

Mayor Bagley has written the board of insurance underwriters with a view of lower insurance rates. He calls attention to the bringing in of mountain water, with a pressure of 70 pounds; to the fine fire apparatus, drawn by horses; to the many new hydrants; to the paved streets, meaning better transit—and thinks all these things should mean a reduction of rates. Certainly the presentation of conditions should mean cheaper insurance.

#### TO OWNERS OF DOGS

The ordinance prescribes that dogs must wear muzzles in the city of Hillsboro until Sept. 15. Those not so supplying muzzles if their dogs run at large will be prosecuted. Canines kept tied and not allowed at large do not come under the provisions of the law.
