

HUSBAND ORDERED COMMITTED TO JAIL

Until he Complied With Order to Pay Wife Suit Money

CIRCUIT JUDGE GETS CAUSTIC

Also Metes Heavy Sentence on Roy Rabel, Gambling Case

Judge Campbell held circuit court this week. The court ordered Rudolph Schultz, of Forest Grove, committed to jail until he complied with the order of the court to pay his wife \$150 for suit money to prosecute her divorce case. Schultz was in court when the court made the order, and he thereupon came through with the funds. His attorneys, Hollis & Graham, afforded no alibi as to Schultz' pecuniary circumstances, but as the money was paid, the wife will now go ahead with her case. She was formerly a Miss Ethel Joy.

Roy Rabel, the barber, who was indicted for gambling, thought he had run against a full fledged cyclone. Campbell fined him \$50 on No. 1, which was paid; \$50 on No. 2, which 60 days are given to pay the fine; \$50 on No. 3, with 120 days to pay; \$500 on the fourth, and \$500 on the fifth, the sentence being suspended on the last two, in case of constant good behavior. This is the heaviest fine ever placed against a party in circuit court here.
