

### CONNOR, PARALYZED, DIES AT COUNTY FARM

Man Aged 64 Years, a Newcomer,  
Found Unconscious by Neighbor  
STRICKEN HOURS BEFORE FOUND  
Was Man of Means And Had Bought 5-  
Acre Tract Below Road's

O. B. Connor, aged about 64 years, either bachelor or widower, was found unconscious at his five-acre place, below the Delisman place, 5 miles southeast of Hillsboro, Saturday, by Constantine Miller, a neighborman laying in an unconscious condition, suffering from a paralytic stroke. He had fallen near the corner of his shack. Miller gave an alarm and Dr. Linklater went to the scene. Connor was taken to the county farm, never regaining consciousness, and died Sunday afternoon.

Connor came here from the John Day section, Grant County, and recently bought five acres just below the Ben Anderson place, afterward bought by the Delismans. He had about \$30 in his pockets, when found, and all his notes and effects were intact. His total assets consist of a house and lot in Dayville, Grant County, about \$4,250 in notes and accounts and bank balances. Telephonic advices from Dayville, near Canyon City, state that he has no relatives there, but that he has a brother in Cincinnati, Ohio, who is a druggist by profession.

Connor's watch was stopped at 4:45, and Dr. Linklater thinks the man must have lain in his stupor, before discovered, all the way from 24 to 36 hours. When Mr. Miller found him, the stricken man could just feebly raise one arm. One eye was entirely sightless, Dr. Linklater states, while the other was but slightly sensitive. The attending physician wound the watch and it started keeping time, and he thinks perhaps it stopped some Friday evening or Saturday morning, although the stroke might have come as early as early as some time Thursday, judging from the condition of the body.

The remains were brought to the Donelson undertaking parlors, and embalmed ready for shipment upon advices from any relatives who may be found. There was not the slightest indication of foul play, and death was due to paralysis only.

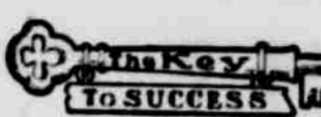

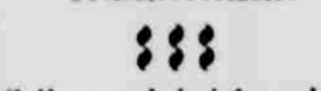

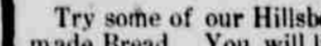
