CITY COUNCIL

The city council met Tuesday night and passed ordinances making 8 per cent. the legal rate of interest on warrants; ratified the exchange of the street sprinkler for a flusher, the latter costing \$1,200, upon the showing that in disposing of the sprinkler the city but \$65 for their use during the year; providing that wood must be removed from the streets within 48 hours after unloading; providing that all building material and debris must be removed within 24 hours after the completion of buildings; and declaring that sweeping from buildings must not be carried to the sidewalks.

A. B. Gordon explained street paving delay by showing that the quarry had pinched out, and machinery had to be moved. He also stated that Third Street, between Washington and Baseline, would ultimately be paved and be placed in specification condition, the soft places being due to water in the soil. Mr. Gordon also stated that rock was now under transit and that all streets would be laid with the base to relieve the situation, even if they had to return in the Spring and finish the surface.

The city has sold the street sprinkler to Tillamook, and shipped it Tuesday. A new "flusher" and sprinkler combined has been purchased by Hillsboro, and Jack Hensley has been using it on the street. At present he is using it only for the flushing proposition, but it has an attachment which can be used as a sprinkler, when the dust gets beyond control.
