HOW DR. F. J. BAILEY PLANNED A STRATEGY

Characteristic Way in Which he Landed Some Fever Patients
TALE FROM CITY OF DESTINY
Daily Ledger, of Tacoma, Recites Some History of Olden Times

Frank Imbrie, of West Union, today handed the Argus a Tacoma Ledger, which has an article telling how Dr. F. J. Bailey, formerly of this city, landed a cargo of fever stricken miners and indigents, over on the Sound. The story follows the recital of Dr. Bailey's purchase of the \$125,000 Rust home. It follows:

Dr. Bailey is a son of Dr. F. A. Bailey, of Hillsboro, Ore., a resident and practicing physician of that city for the past 50 years. For three years he was a surgeon in the army and saw service in the Philippines. He will be remembered chiefly in the Northwest for the part he played at the behest of the government a number of years ago when he was sent to Nome in command of an army transport from San Francisco with instruction to bring down indigents from the Alaska mining camp and miners who were stricken with malignant fever. Surgeon Bailey's passengers were to debark his passengers at Seattle and then proceed to San Francisco. When he arrived at Seattle, however, he was met with a curt refusal by authorities in that city to allow him to land the indigents and sick which included 74 men on cots, all suffering with typhoid, and 27 insane men, some of whom had to be confined to straight-jackets throughout the voyage.

In perplexity Dr. Bailey telegraphed Washington for further advice and was told to follow his earlier instructions and land his passengers at Seattle. Thereupon the surgeon evolved a neat bit of strategy.

Throwing a squad of Marines on the dock at Seattle he telephoned the police department that he had a few "crazies" down at the dock and for them to send the patrol for them. When the patrol came the army surgeon led it up with his 27 "crazies," withdrew his marines to the transport and awaited developments. The only "developments" came when the police found that they had to send in a riot call for a squad of reserves to take care of the "crazies."

Disposition of the typhoid patients came next and again Dr. Bailey showed his strategy. Up on being refused admittance for some of the men at a charity hospital he took another file of marines and four of the patients down town in Seattle to a drug store where he telephoned a hospital to send at once for "some patients." By fours, much like Noah loaded his ark, Capt. Bailey "unloaded" his 74 patients on the Seattle hospitals, withdrew to his transport and left for San Francisco.

Seattle's tremendous wail of opposition to the government authorities at Washington brought no relief and the city was forced to take care of the men who, as Dr. Bailey told Mr. Grafton yesterday, "had spent their money there in the beginning before they left for the far North."
