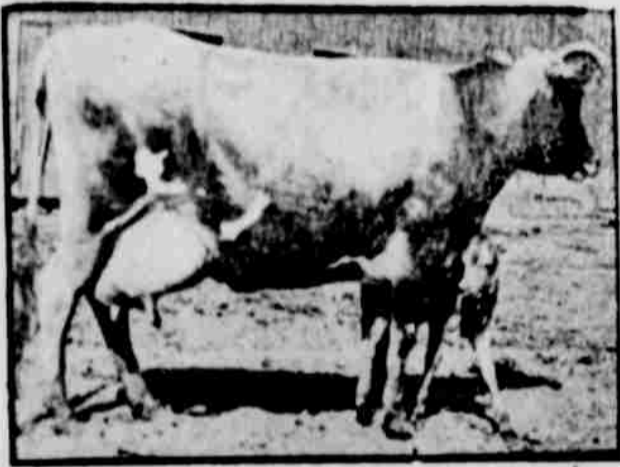

**FIRST ARTESIAN WELL
DRILLED IN COUNTY**

Firm of Stevens & Williams Find Artesian Flow at Christie

FOUR HUNDRED FIFTY FEET DEEP

Water is Soft, Pure and Cool, and is For Cooling Station

The first artesian well struck in Washington County was developed at Christie station, on the United Railways, opposite the home of Henry Carstens, on the Wm. Wilson donation land claim, last Friday.

The firm of Stevens & Williams, of Portland, had a contract for a deep well for the Damascus Creamery Co.'s cooling station at that point, and the artesian flow was struck only after many obstacles had been surmounted.

The flow daily is approximately 100 barrels, and the water is cold, soft and clear. The drilling of the well was a difficult undertaking and was accomplished only after many obstacles had been surmounted. Quicksand and gravel caused many delays, the sand working into the casing many times a distance of over 50 feet, causing a new drilling to be effected. A total of 425 feet was drilled and 380 feet of six inch pipe was driven. There were 375 feet of intermittent gravel, black sand and clay and many colors of quicksand.

The last 50 feet was through solid rock, the first few feet being limestone and the well ended with a strata of black basalt, which was very hard. Sixty feet of quicksand lay above the rock strata, and this was the difficult section for drilling.

The casing has been driven five feet into the solid rock, thus shutting out any possible flow of quicksand and loose formations, and it is impossible for surface water or other accretions to get into the flow.

Guy W. Stevens, the senior partner of the drilling firm was in the city Monday evening, and says that there is excellent prospect for many more artesian flows in that section, and if this is the case a new and important factor has been added to the county's resources.

Washington County at one time was the bed of a vast inland lake, and while there have been indications of oil, the possibility of artesian water has never been advanced.

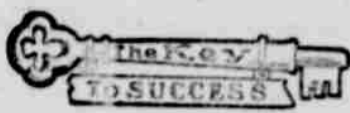
