MASS MEETING NAMES FULL CITY TICKET

H. T. Bagley, Mayor, Nominated to Succeed Self

ON TICKET BY ACCLAMATION

E. I. Kuratli Only Councilman, Holder-Over, Named

The mass meeting at the court house, Monday evening, was attended by about 160 voters. Hon. W. N. Barrett was selected by acclamation as chairman; Fred Siegrist was chosen secretary in the same manner, and Carl Heidel was selected as his assistant.

Upon motion of Wm. Nelson it was decided that all nomination must be made by ballot, and three tellers, W. D. Smith, Wm. Nelson and Willis Ireland were appointed.

John W. Connell placed Mayor H. T. Bagley in nomination to succeed himself, and, there being no opposition, the rules were suspended and he was declared the nominee by acclamation. Mr. Barrett seconded the mayor's nomination.

Nominations for the council were:

Kuratli and R. C. Vaughn were named by acclamation—David Kuratli placing Mr. Vaughn in nomination, Mr. Wiley naming Mr. Kuratli. This was for the first ward.

Second ward—Thos. Wilkes and C. Jack Jr. were the nominees, the amusing feature of the Jack nomination being that Andrew Jack and C. Jack Jr. were running against each other. It took three ballots to decide in favor of the son.

Third ward—The following were voted upon: Willis Ireland, Wm. Mahon, M. H. Stevenson, Jas. Miltenberger, O. B. Gates and A. J. Roy. Ireland and Gates withdrew, and Roy Stevenson were nominated. Miltenberger was not present, and Mr. Mahon had departed before he was placed in nomination.

For recorder, John Dennis named C. A. Lamkin, and Mr. Schmidlein placed A. C. Shute before the meeting. Mr. Shute was not present. Shute was given 55 ballots on the first votes, with Lamkin 53. The third ballot gave Lamkin the nomination by a vote of 48.

Fred Sewell was named for treasurer by acclamation.

The following committee on vacancies was appointed—John W. Connell, B. P. Cornelius and Elmer Johnson.
