The Oregon law on voting may be cumbersome, but it gives its people the quiet election, just the same. In the hundreds of votes cast here Tuesday there was nothing to excite the suffragette or the single taxer. There was no argument, no altercations, no fights, no rowdiness, and no drunkenness.

The day was more like a holiday and it was the first presidential election absolutely devoid of bitterness. The Bull mooser, the Elephant, the Donkey, and the water wagon, all held sway without rancor. Each side had hope sticking out of the lapel pocket, and each was confident that the "right side" would win.

Voting was very slow on account of the lengthy ballot, and many were sworn in. Men were trooping to notaries all day, with six men to swear them in, having failed to register.

While this is cumbersome, it is better than to have the election board swear them in, as this would delay the balloting.

Now for four years more of quiet before we have another little family disturbance—but we shall have a state and county election two years hence—so cheer up!
