GERMAN MUTUAL HOLDS ITS BIG ANNUAL MEETING

Washington County Institution
Elects Directors Monday

REPORT SHOWS SPLENDID CONDITION

Has Membership of Several Hundred in
County and Elsewhere

The German Mutual Fire Insurance Association of Washington County held its annual session at Krebs Hall, Hillsboro, Monday afternoon, with President S. E. Graf, of Bethany, presiding, and the Secretary, Erwin Ritter, keeping the records. There was a big attendance, and the reports of the officers were replete with interest.

Alfred Guerber, of Helvetia, incumbent, and William Maase, of South Tualatin, were elected directors; John Meyer, of Bethany, was re-elected treasurer, and John Wismer, of Bethany, was elected auditor.

The reports showed that there had been but one assessment in the organization for over two years, and that was last July. The loss by fire for the year was a trifle over \$1,000, and the losses were promptly met. It was shown that the annual cost, total, for each \$1,000 of fire insurance was but \$1.84—a fine showing compared with other mutuals, which have gone as high as \$3 per thousand for the year. The cheapness of the cost is doubtless due to the fact that only farm property is insured, while other mutuals insure in the city. Some of the members are in favor of extending their insurance to residence property in the city, but look askance at the proposal to insure business buildings.

This organization was founded in Washington County between 25 and 30 years ago, and it has been a matter of pride that every fire loss has been promptly settled. Their rate is cheap because they have no big office expenses, and no high salaries to pay. The standing of the Association is of the best, and as a local business institution it ranks highly.

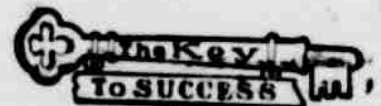
