WILSON ELECTORS SEND MESSENGER TO COLLEGE

Hugh McLain, of Coos County, Wins the Trip to Washington

ALBERT TOZIER MADE AN ELECTOR

John M. Wall Was Elected Presiding Officer of Oregon Electors

The Wilson electors for Oregon met at Salem, Monday, and as a result Hon. Hugh McLain, of Coos County, will carry Oregon's vote back to Washington, D. C., and cast it for Woodrow Wilson for President of the United States. There were but four electors present at the capital when organization was perfected. D. M. Watson, of Portland, was detained in Virginia, and he wired the other four of his inability to return home. They thereupon chose, under the law, Albert Tozier, a former Hillsboro resident, to act as elector during the proceedings. Each elector's name was placed in a blank envelope and sealed, and then deposited in a box. Mr. Brown, clerk of the state land board, then drew out an envelope and passed it to President Wall. It contained the name of the Coos County elector, and Mr. Wall announced the election, which was then unanimously ratified. The electors then certified to the minutes of the convention, each taking one copy.

The drawing was entirely fair, and meets with the approval of all the electors. It was decided that this was the better way, and was a system which would be fair to each elector.

Thus it goes down to history that although Washington County could not send a man back to Washington with Oregon's vote, it at least had two presidential electors—and that is some distinction.
