Fruit Inspector H. C. Atwell, of Forest Grove, was in the city Tuesday. He has arranged a series of horticultural meetings for the county, and lectures will be given by Prof. Barss, department of plant pathology, O. A. C.; A. C. Goodrich, horticultural commissioners of the first district; H. M. Williams, secretary of the State Board of Horticulture, and others. The dates are Orenco, Feb. 1, at 7:30 p. m.; Forest Grove, Feb. 1, at 2 p. m.; North Plains, Feb. 3, at 1:30 p. m.; Banks, Feb. 4, at 2 p. m.; Gales Creek, Feb. 5, at 2 p. m.; Cornelius, Feb. 6, at 10 a. m.; Hillsboro Feb. 6, at 1 p. m.; Gaston, Feb. 7, 10 a. m.; Beaverton, Feb. 10, at 10 a. m.; Sherwood, Feb. 11, at 10 a. m.; Tualatin, Feb. 11, at 2 in the afternoon. Fruit growing, the care of orchards and many things pertaining to the industry, will be discussed at these meetings.

The Hillsboro meeting will be held at the Grand Theatre.
