## DESTITUTE CASES BEFORE THE COURT

Children Taken From Mother and Sent to Boys' & Girls' Aid

MOTHER SENT TO THE POOR FARM

Grandmother, Almost Blind, Will be Next for Court to Consider

One of the pitiable cases in the annals of court procedure was before Judge D. B. Reasoner, Tuesday, when Mrs. Elmira Whitford, of below Scholls, was brought into court with four children, three small ones, ranging from 13 years down to a lad of seven, and another grown daughter, who had with her two daughters, Mary, aged 7, and Inez, a little child of two years. The grandmother, married daughter, and children of both families, have been living down below Scholls, where two older boys had bought a place. The house was filthy and the grandmother was almost blind, notwithstanding she has young children.

J. Teuscher Jr., agent for the Boys' and Girls' Aid, prosecuted the case, and it was brought out that Mrs. Adams, the daughter, had at one time ran away to Portland with one Jack Wilson, now in the calaboose on a statutory charge.

The officials found the place almost destitute, the children not well, and in a situation that meant moral uncertainty for the children. Judge Reasoner held that the grandmother, Mrs. Whitford and her son in his teens, could go home; that Mrs. Adams, who is ill, must go to the poor farm, and that Sylvia and Jos. Whitford should go to the Society, as well as Mary and Inez Adams, and Agent Teuscher took the little ones away Tuesday evening.

Mrs. Adams was belligerent, and swore that she would die before she would give up her children. It required two, Sheriff Reeves and Deputy Wall to get her to the county farm without trouble, and even at that she did some tall striking and scratching.
