OVER ONE HUNDRED KNIGHTS AT MECCA

Visit McMinnville Saturday in Great District Convention

DELEGATIONS FROM ALL LODGES

Most Successful Meeting Since Installation of Order Here

Washington County had the distinction of sending the greatest number of Pythian representatives to a convention in the history of the order in this section last Saturday evening, when over 100 members of that fraternity journeyed across the wastes to McMinnville to meet with the K. of P. from Polk and Yamhill Counties. Grand Chancellor Gwynn, of Pendleton, was in attendance, and stated that it was the finest gathering in the history of his career outside of a grand lodge body.

Hillsboro, with 40 members; Glencoe, with 14; Forest Grove, with 38; Cornelius, 5; and Gaston, with perhaps 10 made up the Washington County list of visitors at the all-night session. Mayor Vinton, in a well rounded speech, welcomed the visitors after they were escorted to the hall by the McMinnville Knights, headed by a band of twenty pieces. John Zimmerman responded for North Plains; Grant Mann for Cornelius; C. O. Roe for Forest Grove, and the veteran Pythian, J. H. Westcott, did the honors for Gaston.

Work was emphasized in the first, second and third ranks, and Fred Robertson, well known at Gaston, was proved a knight, receiving the rank of the order in the presence of over 200 visitors. The session did not close until four o'clock in the morning, and it was voted the premier meeting for good cheer and enthusiasm. McMinnville, as host, was all that could be asked.

COUNTY COURT

The county commissioners' court met here Monday and affixed the warrant of tax collection on the 1913 rolls, and approved the bond of tax collector Reeves, Mr. Reeves put up his bond of \$50,000 for the safe keeping of the funds, with sureties as follows: Edw. Schulmerich, W. H. Wehrung, A. C. Shute, J. A. Thornburgh and A. S. Sholes.

Upon the showing of a large petition and a receipt from the county treasurer, E. B. Sappington, Beauford Creps and John Minto were granted license to sell liquor at Timber, for a period of one year. Creps & Minto executed a good and sufficient bond to conduct an orderly place, and took their paper home with them. A deed for the D. B. Barkhalter rock quarry, six acres survey, was received and ordered placed upon records of the county.

The following funds were ordered transferred: \$150 from Road District No. 35 to Road District No. 18, \$32.68 from Road District 13 to the county road fund; \$150 from District 35 to District 45.

Cornell University writes to a private party in Hillsboro, asking for the location of one Geo. Linton. The registrar states that in 1871 one Geo. Henry Pancake registered as a student there, and disappeared shortly afterward. He writes that he lately heard that Pancake came to Hillsboro and settled here under the name of Linton. No one here appears to know anything about the party.

Rollo Wright has finished the purchase of a carload of heifers, and will ship them to Buhl, Idaho, Saturday. Dr. Reagan will inspect the bunch of youngsters, Thursday and Friday, and get them ready to pass into the upper country. Notwithstanding it is said to be hard to get stock in the county Mr. Wright had no particular trouble in landing his car lot.

Contractor Jos. Loring and crew leveled the court yard back of and in front of the court house annex, this week, and removed the big maple tree obstructing the east view. It helps the appearance of the public square immensely.

Automobiles have been running into the country with marked success the past few days, the roads having become as hard as a pavement in all excepting the low places.

H. J. Smith, of Roy, was down to the city Monday. He reported the roads as getting better every day.

R. Pabols, one of the West Union farmer, was over to the city Monday afternoon.
