POULTRY ASS'N. HAS OFFER TO STUDENTS

Plan Will Add Money to the Premium Fund

CHANCE FOR ALL THE STUDENTS

Association Says it Will Mean Better and More Poultry

"We, the Washington County Poultry Association submit to the county school superintendent a proposition whereby the association might interest the pupils of the public schools in better poultry and more of it; and in consideration of these facts we submit the following rules:

Rule No. 1—We will furnish a setting of 15 hen or 12 duck eggs at \$2.50 per setting, of any well known variety, from a mating of standard breed stock as owned and bred by the fanciers of the association whose names appear on folder to be issued later.

Rule No. 2—Eggs are guaranteed to be true to name and 70 per cent fertile when set under a hen.

Rule No. 3—50 per cent of all money received from the orders, to be held by the secretary of the association and paid over to the county superintendent to be distributed as premiums, at time and place of school fair as designated by county superintendent, to be divided equally among each class, entered as follows: 30 per cent first pens, 20 per cent second pens, 10 per cent first cockerels, 5 per cent second cockerels, 10 per cent first pullets, 5 per cent second pullets, 5 per cent on first solid colored cockerel, 5 per cent on best solid colored pullet, 5 per cent on parti-colored cockerel, 5 per cent on best parti-colored pullet.

Rule No. 4—Premium on ducks as follows: First trio 40 per cent, second trio 20 per cent, first drake 10 per cent, second drake 5 per cent, first duck 10 per cent, second duck 5 per cent, to be divided equally between each class entered.

Rule No. 5—It is further agreed by the association that they will issue a pamphlet with the rules and regulations by which the teacher and pupils may be governed and furnished to every teacher in the county.

Rule No. 6—All orders to be cash, and forwarded to G. M. Littlehales, secretary, Forest Grove, Ore.

Rule No. 7—All reports of unsatisfactory orders and infertile eggs to be made direct to the secretary and O. K'd by the teacher of their respective schools.

Rule No. 8—All birds exhibited in competition for the above prizes are to be hatched from eggs purchased through the association only.

Rule No. 9—Scholars wishing further information about any particular breed may write the secretary who will refer the matter of the breeder of that variety best adapted to answer the same.

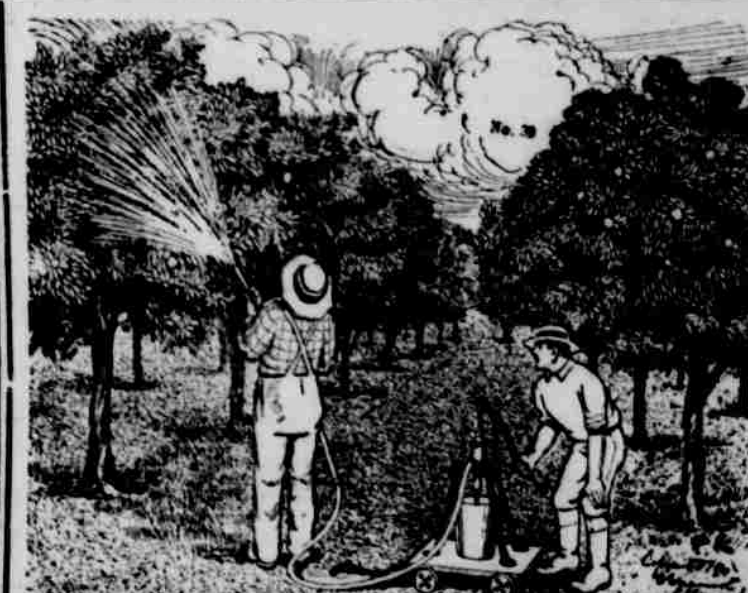
