LAND DECISION

United States District Judge Bean has signed decrees in the cases of 23 "innocent purchasers," as approved by Attorney-General Wickersham who was satisfied of their innocence of fraud in securing lands involved in the general land forfeiture suit against the Oregon & California Railroad and its successors.

There are 45 claimants. By an act Congress, passed August 20, 1912, the Attorney-General was directed to make an examination as to how purchasers of land from the railroad company, in amounts of 1000 acres and over and which were included in the original grant, had secured these lands and if in his judgment it was determined that the claimants were free from fraud and collusion he should so find and then the lands could be sold to the claimants at the rate of \$2.50 per acre.

The remainder of the 45 "innocent purchaser" claimants are preparing to submit evidence as to their non-fraudulent ownership and this testimony will be heard before a special examiner during the coming Summer.

The decrees are that the lands, mentioned in each, revert absolutely to the Government with a perfect title in them, but that the alleged owners can secure a patent to them by paying to the Government \$2.50 per acre within six months after the decree is signed.

There is another class of "innocent purchasers," of land from the Oregon & California Railroad and its successors, that is not directly mentioned in this act. It is the purchasers of tracts less than 1000 acres and the act provides that the Government must enter suit to recover such tracts within one year after its passage and as there is no intention of the Government to instigate such suits a perfect title, equal to a patent, will automatically be created after August 20, 1913.

In the 45 "innocent purchasers" suits nearly 500,000 acres are involved for which the Government will be paid \$2.50 per acre.—Oregonian.
