COUNTY TEACHERS IN SESSION IN HILLSBORO

Track Meet of Public Schools
Soon to Meet
WILL PERFORM AT FOREST GROVE
Many Athletic Events Will be on Extended Program

The Washington County Teachers' Association held a very profitable meeting last Saturday, at the Hillsboro school building. The session was attended by about fifty teachers. It was decided to hold no more meetings this school year. The past year has been a very interesting one for the association.

After a short business session, the following subjects were discussed by Superintendent Barnes, Reading Circle Work; School Fair; Annual Institute, and the Athletic Association. The Annual Institute this year will be held on the department plan. This seemed to meet with the approval of every teacher.

The afternoon session was a joint meeting with the Grange convention in the Grange Hall. Two very instructive lectures were given on industrial work, one by Prof. Gentile, of Monmouth, and one by N. C. Maris, of Salem.

The annual Washington County school Field and Track meet will be held in Forest Grove some time in April, under the auspices of Pacific University. The P. U. silver cup, which is now in the possession of the Hillsboro school, will be put up for the second time. The school making the most points will win the cup. The individual prizes will be gold and silver medals for first and second places in each event.

Track meet rules—Each pupil must maintain an average of 80 per cent., and not fall below 75 per cent. in any subject. Each high school pupil must carry at least three regular subjects aside from manual training. Each pupil must have been in regular attendance at school for the preceding three months. No one who has finished a four year high school course shall be allowed to compete.

Events Open for All—440 yd sprint; 220 yd sprint; 100 yd sprint; 50 yd sprint; 220 yd 30 min hurdles; 120 yd 42 min hurdles; shot put; pole vault; standing broad jump; running broad jump; running high jump; standing high jump; half mile relay.

Grammar Grades Only—50 yd dash; 100 yd dash; running broad jump; running high jump.
