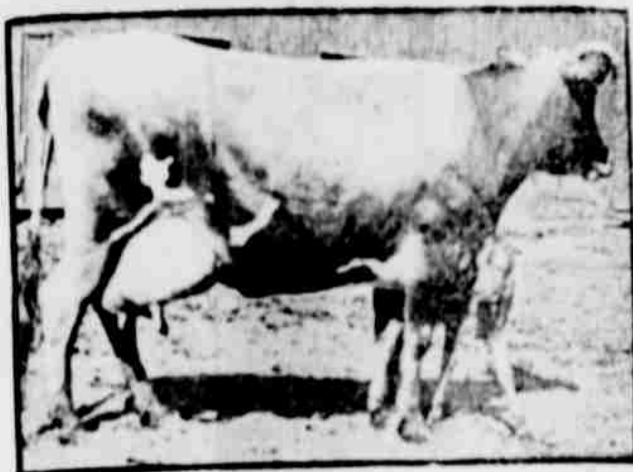


SPRING GROVE FARM JERSEYS

CHAS. G. LINDGREN GUILTY AND PAROLED

Judge Campbell Gives Former Sa-
loon Man a Lecture

CHARGE, LARCENY BY BAILEE

Told Him That Breach of Such a Trust
Meant Dishonor Always

Charles G. Lindgren, coming from a pioneer family of good reputation, was in court, Tuesday, and pleaded guilty to larceny of less than \$100, entrusted to him while he was in the saloon business at Timber. Waldemar Seton was present as attorney for Lindgren, and stated that the defendant wished to plead guilty and throw himself on the mercy of the court. Lindgren, he said, was now at honest toil, and asked clemency because of his wife, who has stood faithfully with Lindgren during his long wait in jail, before a bond was procured. The court sentenced from one to ten years in the penitentiary, but paroled on condition of good behavior. Judge Campbell told him that larceny of this nature always meant distrust of his fellows, and that he would have a hard time to live it down. Any infraction of proper conduct, the court said, would mean that he must be brought before him for sentence.
