JUDGE CAMPBELL CALLS MARCH GRAND JURY

Court Instructs and Then Names Mr. Thompson as the Foreman

EVEREST INDICTED, MANSLAUGHTER

Will Go To Trial on Indictments in Near Future—Trial Set

Judge Campbell named the grand jury for March term. Clerk Luce drawing the seven names from the jury box. The jurors are: Jesse B. Thompson, foreman; I. H. Maxwell, Grover Combs, Allen Rice, F. W. Maitland, M. T. Cox, and C. E. Koontz.

The court enumerated the duties of the grand jury, and told them that this selection was one of the most important that could come to a citizen.

He advised them to be careful in making indictments, and to be sure of their ground before voting such an instrument. He stated that he did not suppose they would long be held as jurors as the latest jury had cleaned up the most of the criminal work. Jurors were excused as follows—A. F. Dethlefs, for term; Hermann Schmidt and Jake Milne, for two weeks, and L. F. Emmott for one week.

Dr. Ernest Everest, indicted for manslaughter, pleaded not guilty, and his trial on this charge will follow later. The state witness in the case is one Louise Wright, now married, and to whose license Dr. Everest recently swore in the county clerk's office. His trial on the statutory charge was set for March 28. Everest's bond on the manslaughter charge, involving mal-

practice, was fixed at \$2,000, and Sheriff Reeves Monday evening locked the physician in the jail. J. A. Baker, the Gaston physician and druggist, against whom there were 19 indictments, was brought into court and pleaded guilty to the first charge. On this he was fined \$500 or 250 days in jail. On the second indictment he was fined \$50 and costs or 25 days in jail.

The fine of \$500 was paid and the Dr. was paroled on the other 18 indictments, provided he lives the life of a good citizen in the sweet future.

Trials were set as follows—Bagley & Hare vs. Janey Galbreath, March 26; Bryant vs. Heisler, April 1; Walton vs. Bruggerman, March 31; State vs. Andrew Beggi, Beaverton, statutory rape, April 3; State vs. McCurdy, charge of rape, Cornelius case, April 3.

G.
