Willis D. Hoag, a lineman who worked for the Washington-Oregon Corporation last Summer, and who was injured near the Cornelius substation by contact, when a dead wire crossed with a current wire, has sued the company and its manager, G. M. Turner, and Art. Gilmore, for damages, the sum sued for being \$35,000. The accident happened July 23, just before quitting time in the evening. Hoag's cries were heard and he was taken from a perilous position by means of a ladder. His attorneys were before Judge Rensoner Tuesday, taking evidence, both Mr. Turner and Mr. Gilmore having been on the stand. The method of taking testimony before trial has been practiced here but very few times, but the law warrants the proceeding in certain cases. Hoag was laid up many months and still carries the marks of his accident. He is a son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. C. R. Bloyd, of South Hillsboro. Foreman Moon was with Hoag when the accident took place. According to the statement of Supt. Turner, the company has paid out, for wages given, physicians' attendance, drugs, nurse hire, etc., to Hoag, since the accident, over \$1300. Hoag was on the payroll all the time, until the suit was brought, according to the company's contention.

F. E. Straight, who bought the Wm. Musgrove place, near Orenco, was in town today, accompanying Mr. Musgrove. Mr. Straight has worked for years with Tatum & Bowen, of Portland, and is now with the Stewart Bros. Co. Logging Supplies, of Portland. He will stay on the road, and his boys will run the newly acquired ranch.
