Notice of Sidewalk Ordinance

Notice is hereby given that the City Council of the City of Hillsboro, Oregon, did, on April 22, 1913, pass an Ordinance requiring a cement sidewalk to be constructed on the South side of Washington Street, in the City of Hillsboro, Oregon, from the Northwest corner of Block 17, in the Town [now City] of Hillsboro, Oregon, to a point 49 feet East of the Northwest corner of Lot 3, in Block 17, in the Town [now City] of Hillsboro, Oregon, from the Northwest corner of Block 30, Wehrung's Addition Block 30 to the Town, now City, of Hillsboro, Oregon, to the Northeast corner of said Block 30, Wehrung's Addition Block 30 to the Town, now City, of Hillsboro, Oregon, and from the Northeast corner of Block 10, in said City, to the Northeast corner of Block 2, in Block 10, in said City, the lots, portions of lots, parcels or tracts of land abutting upon said sidewalk, with the names of the owners, being as follows:

Lot 1, Block 17, in the Town [now City] of Hillsboro, Oregon, Rose Wilcox

Said sidewalk shall be constructed so as to conform to the official elevation established by said City, shall be five feet wide, the inner line to be one foot from the property line and shall in all respects conform to the provisions of the Ordinances of said City and subject to the approval of the City Engineer.
