GREENBERG HEIGHTS YOUNG MAN SUICIDES

Iva Rogers, Son of Chas. Rogers and Wife, Ends Life With Pistol

TRIGGERED WITH A VARICOSE ULCER

No Other Reason was Assigned for Rash Act of Young Fellow

Iva Rogers, aged 20 years, son of Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Rogers, of Greenberg Heights, committed suicide Monday afternoon, by shooting himself in the temple with a .38-calibre revolver. The shot was heard by members of the family, and when they rushed to a small building 200 yards from the residence the young man was found in a pool of blood, with a revolver lying by his side. The parents know of no reason why the boy should have killed himself unless it was because he became despondent over the slowness of healing of a varicose ulcer on one of his legs.

Young Rogers was in Beaverton, Monday forenoon, and went to the drug store to buy arsenate of lead. Not finding any, he then went to the Cadz & Co. store, where he bought the cartridges, one of which ended his life. The bullet tore through his temple, ranging upward, coming out at the upper side of the skull.

The boy was of exemplary habits, and had never acted strangely—at least his actions, according to the family, had never excited suspicion.

Coroner Dr. Barrett went to the Heights on the four o'clock car and found that the boy still had signs of life, although it seemed impossible, considering the terrible wound. The jury found that he came to death by means of a wound, self-inflicted.

ONE WAY TO FORGIVE

Two well known citizens of the lower part of the county who had been friends for many years, finally had a disagreement that resulted in a bitter fight for several years. Mutual friends, realizing the genuine worth of them, concluded that it was worth while to get them together, have a reconciliation, and have them in the grasp of friendship once more. One was more than willing, while the other, after much argument, concluded that he would give in to the solicitation of his friends, and a meeting was thereupon brought about, in front of the home of the mutual friends.

The whole bunch was there to witness the settling of the bitter estrangement. The one most willing stated that he would forgive all past offences, and pledged himself to act as a gentleman in all respects, and thus wipe out the old scores. The other fellow, the last to give in, said: "Well, gentlemen, I am doing this because so many of our mutual friends have solicited me. I am willing to call things square, and will do nothing that is not right hereafter. I will put no straw in his way and add no feather of burden to his back—unless there is a little tar there for the feather to stick upon." The meeting broke up forthwith.
