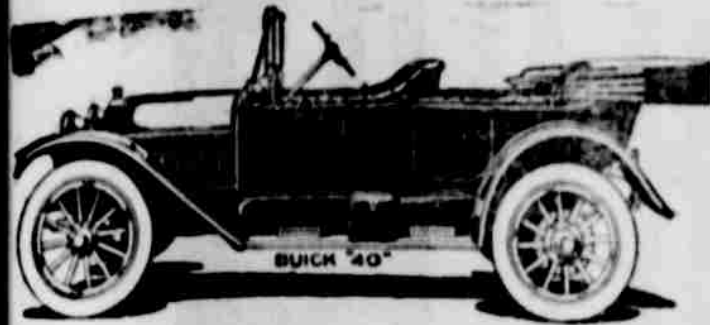

## TIMELY ADVICE FOR THE FRUIT GROWERS

R. Leis Says it is About Time to Think of Spraying for Codling

TAKE TIME BY THE FORELOCK

Beaverton Man, Upon Request, Sends in Timely Article on Culture

R. Leis, the Beaverton fruit grower, upon request of the Argus and its friends, sends in the following article on spraying for the Codling moth:

Editor Argus: The first spraying for the codling moth, or worms, will soon be here, and as I have to redeem my promise, will give an outline how I keep them under control, and, of course, raise clean fruit. Out of 130 boxes of apples that I have taken notice of I had two apples where the worm had entered by the calyx cup. Now there are many that raise fruit, and want to raise clean fruit, but do not know when and how and what to spray with. Space does not permit to go in all details. About 6 or 8 days after the blossom has fallen, I use 2 1/2 to 3 lbs. neutral arsenate of lead to 50 gallons of water, adding about 2 1/2 gallons of standard strength lime and sulphur solution. The first is for the worms, the latter for scab. This is the principal spraying, and if you omit this spraying, you may as well not spray later, for subsequent spraying will do no good. The object of this spraying is to fill the calyx cup of the apple with poison, as it is now wide open. In a few days the calyx cup closes, as the apple enlarges, and you can not force the spray into it. Use a Bordeaux nozzle, with high pressure, and have the nozzle turned down as then you will have more pressure to force it into the calyx cup. Do not spray when the blossom is still on the trees as the stamen is not withered and it will be hard to get in the inner cup, and besides you will kill all your bees which I consider the best friend of the orchardist, for without them we would, I believe, raise very few apples or other fruit. After experimenting with different brands of arsenates I have found the Grassell's neutral does the work better than any other kind, and I can recommend it to be the best to be got and it can be used in combination with lime and sulphur solution; then you spray with one spraying, both for scab and codling moth. Do not use any acid arsenate of lead, as the lime and sulphur will not combine with it, and it will be useless and of no value whatever and liable to burn. The Grassell's brand is used at Hood and Rogue River by all the union, and it was the only arsenate of lead that stood the test of all samples analyzed at the Corvallis station, so there must be a good reason. For your accommodation I will keep it on hand. Do not use Bordeaux mixture with this spraying as it will russet the fruit. Your next spraying will be about the 20th of June, up to about the 28th, as this is the time the codling moths deposit their eggs, and they hatch in about 7 to 10 days, and after a day or so make for the apple, and crawling into a hiding place (the calyx cup) their first meal is about their last, if the calyx cup is filled with poison. I know from practical observation that from 85 to 90 per cent. enter by that means so you see how important it is to spray well. I don't know if the law can compel any one to spray for worms, but I do know that the fruit inspector can put his ban on some of the apples if they are wormy and offered for sale at any place or store. Besides, a wormy apple is only fit for hogs. I did not intend to make this letter so long, but there is so much to be said, and I would like to see others do as well as I have done, and it does not take so much effort either, for there is no section of the country that can raise better fruit than Washington County. Before I forget—spray your chicken houses with Winter strength of lime and sulphur solution. It is far superior to white-wash, or any expensive lice killer on the market. One good spraying will keep your chicken houses clean of vermin and mites for the Summer. If you are troubled with green aphid or woolly aphid, use tobacco extract one to sixty, or black leaf, 40. Spray with pressure before the leaves curl, as it will then be very hard to get at them. You can add this to your spray when spraying for worms.
