#### SIRES AND SONS.

M. I. Crow of Los Angeles, recently completed a forty-one day fast, undertaken to reduce weight. W. W. Astor of London has got a bullet for his son John on the staff of Lord Hardinge, governor general of India. M. Poincare, president of France, has been honored by a membership in the Order of St. Andrew, recently bestowed on him by the czar. Sir William May, who has seen fifty-one years of service in the British navy, succeeds Sir Charles Frederick Hoatham as admiral of the fleet. Professor Ernst Haeckel, the famous German savant, recently celebrated his seventy-ninth birthday at Jena. He is still alert mentally, but is physically weak. Geoffrey O'Hara, who has been commissioned by the secretary of the Interior to preserve and develop the music of the American Indian, is a composer of note and at present an instructor in music under the bureau of Indian affairs. Earl Brenchamp, rumored as likely to succeed the Duke of Connaught as governor general of Canada next fall, began his public career at twenty-three, when he became mayor of Worcester. When just turned twenty-seven he received the appointment of governor of New South Wales and became a popular official.

#### Train and Track.

Siberia has only one railroad. Twenty-six states of the United States now require automatic couplers and brakes on railway trains. Just outside of Chicago there is a locomotive roundhouse which is really round and which will accommodate fifty-eight engines. The London and Northwestern railway management reports very satisfactory results from a "grievance hearer," an office created for the purpose of adjusting grievances of employees.

#### Simplified Spelling.

Simplified spellers include "mony" in their list. Others will protest that the shortage of money is already too evident.—Kansas City Star. A new set of rules has been issued by the simplified spelling board. It begins to appear that the old kind was just as easy.—Cleveland Plain Dealer.

#### The World's Religions.

There are of all varieties about 400,000,000 Christians in the world. The Buddhists number 500,000,000, the Mohammedans 200,000,000, the Confucians 100,000,000, Hindus 200,000,000, leaving about 1,000,000 savages or semi-civilized, whose theological opinions, if they have any, it would be difficult to classify.

#### Lemon Peel.

Lemon peel should be pared off lemons very thinly. The pith under the yellow is bitter and not used at all in cookery. Only the thin yellow rind and juice should be used.

#### Barbers in Austria.

In Austria an apprentice barber must serve four years before he is a journeyman. They are paid 41 cents a week for the first year, 61 cents the second, 81 cents the third and \$12 the fourth. They get gratuities from customers besides. Austrian barbers object to the American barber chairs because they compel a barber to stand erect while shaving a customer, when they are used to stooping over. In Prague the charges are for a shave 4 to 12 cents, hair cut 8 to 22 cents.

#### Keeps the Light Going.

Ingenious mechanism in a lighthouse in Germany that uses electricity as an illuminant switches on a new lamp and moves it into focus should the original lamp be extinguished.

#### Moscow's Barber Shops.

In Moscow, Russia, the average income of the ordinary barber shop owner is \$2,000 to \$4,000 a year, and the charges for services are 5 to 10 cents a shave, 5 to 20 cents for a hair cut, 15 to 30 cents for a shampoo and from 25 cents up for massage.

#### Pike's Peak.

Although not the highest mountain, Pike's peak is probably the best known peak in the United States. There was at one time a weather bureau station on its summit, and it now has a substantial railway station at the terminus of the highest railway line in North America.

## GERMAN SPEAKING FOLKS RESENT CORNELIUS' ACT

### Plainly State That They Will Direct Their Trade to Other Towns

#### AVER THEY DO NOT LIKE DRY VOTE

#### Personal Liberty Slogan Taken up by German Speaking Societies

A week ago last Sunday a large number of German speaking people from Cornelius and vicinity, met at the home of the one of their members, up above Blooming, and took up the matter of Cornelius going dry. As a matter of fact these people are sober, industrious and thrifty, and they have always wanted their glass of beer when in town doing their trading. They cost our courts but little, for the German, as a rule, is peaceful and dignified. But he wants his right to go and buy his glass of beer when he wants it, and he doesn't want anyone to say him "No."

It was to this discussion of things that the Germans met, and they did not beat about the bush like diplomats—they simply struck the nail on the head from the start. In other words they passed the following resolution, directed to the Mayor and city council of Cornelius:

"Cornelius, Ore., May 3, 1913. To the honorable members of the Council of the City of Cornelius, Oregon, or all concerned: Gentlemen:

We the German Speaking Society of Cornelius, Ore., have passed a resolution in our last meeting on May 3rd in which we express our deepest regret in being denied our personal liberty by denying us our refreshments while trading in our home stores by voting Cornelius dry. We have further resolved that during this period to direct our trade to other places where we are not denied this privilege and hope as a mutual benefit, you will use your best efforts to help restore former conditions.

Gerhard Goetze Wm. Schendel President Secretary. Since Cornelius went dry many Germans have traded in other towns, and if Cornelius remain dry they say that very few of the Teuton element will do business in that city.
