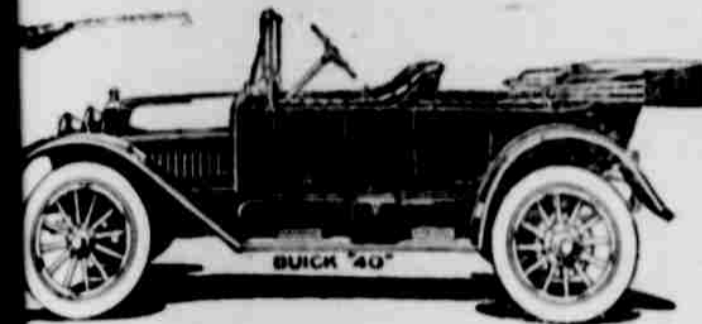

COUNTY COURT FAILS TO TAKE BUILDING

Contractor and Bonding Company Representative Have Session

WITH COUNTY OFFICIALS TUESDAY

All Day Session Ends in Failure, but Stipulation May Follow

Contractor Foster, Architect Gauntt, a representative of the bonding company which was surety for Foster's completion of the court house annex, and the county court held a session Tuesday for the purpose of trying to get a settlement out of the tangle that has followed the building of the court house annex. A stipulation may be had any day, as a result of the deliberation. The court and contractor have agreed on deductions from the contract price for unfinished work, the court to finish, with but one exception, that of the terra cotta cornice, which is not matched in coloring. This, Contractor Foster alleges, the terra cotta furnishers will agree to put in according to plans and specifications. He said they had agreed to treat the material with a chemical in order to have the coloring uniform. The court and contractor got together on about \$2,000 of a deduction.

The representative of the bonding company said that his only wish was to have the court agree to this settlement and allow Foster about \$2,000 with which to pay bills that were agreed upon. This would leave about \$2,700 back on the structure, and he said his company would stipulate to permit the county to use the building without releasing the company from their bond liability. Deputy Tongue, representing the county, said he would not agree to such stipulation, as it would cost \$4,000 to put in the terra cotta provided the proposed chemical treatment was not a success, and this would not leave a sufficient balance to pay the expense, and it would then be up to the county to take action against the bonding people. Mr. Tongue stated that he wanted the money held back, so as to leave the county safe in all events.

The matter will be taken up with the terra cotta people by J. M. Wall, attorney for Foster, at once, and if they can promise anything substantial, perhaps a stipulation may be signed.

Judge Reasoner told the contractor that the county should have some damages for being kept out of the building for eight months past the time of completion. On this there was no agreement, however.
