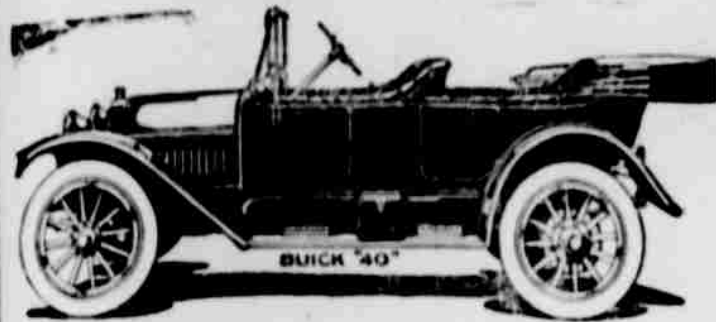

ANNUAL SCHOOL MEET- INGS, MONDAY, JUNE 16

Supt. Barnes Gives Argus Quali-
fications of Voters, Both Sexes

MEETINGS MATTER OF IMPORTANCE

Patrons of Schools Should Get Out and
Take Part in Sessions

Annual school meetings, for the
election of school officers and
such other business as may be
prescribed, will take place all
over Washington County, Mon-
day, June 16. As a rule, these
meetings are poorly attended,
which is an anomaly, as thousands
of dollars are expended for school
purposes.

As there is always the ques-
tion of who is qualified to vote
at these meetings Supt. Barnes,
upon request, furnishes the Ar-
gus with the following digest—

School Districts Classified—
All districts with one thousand
or more children of school age
shall be known as districts of the
first class. All districts with
more than two hundred and less
than one thousand children shall
be known as districts of the sec-
ond class. All districts with less
than two hundred children of
school age shall be known as dis-
tricts of the third class.

Qualification of Voters—
Any citizen of this State, male
or female, who is twenty-one
years of age and has resided in
the district thirty days imme-
diately preceding the meeting or
election, and has property in the
district, as shown by the last
county assessment, and not as-
sessed by the sheriff, on which
he or she is liable or subject to
pay a tax, shall be entitled to
vote at any school election or
meeting in said district; provided
that for the purposes of this sec-
tion, any man who has declared
his intention to become a citizen
of the United States, and has re-
sided in the State for six months
immediately preceding the meet-
ing or election where he proposes
to vote, shall be considered a cit-
izen of this State; provided, fur-
ther that any person shall be
deemed to have complied with
the property qualifications im-
posed by this section who pre-
sents the directors or judges of
election satisfactory evidence
that he or she has stock, shares
or ownership in any corporation,
firm, or co-partnership which has
property in the district, as shown
by the last county assessment,
and not assessed by the sheriff,
on which such corporation, firm,
or co-partnership pays a tax,
even though his or her individual
name does not appear upon the
tax roll; provided further that in
districts of the third class any
head of the family who is other-
wise a qualified elector, and hav-
ing children of school age, may
vote at such election without
property qualifications.

MAIL CARRIERS MEET

The Washington County mail
carriers held a very successful
meeting at Beaverton, May 30.
The visitors were met at the
trains by a delegation of Beaver-
ton residents, who with automo-
biles conveyed them to Boyd's
grove, where arrangements had
been made for their reception.
The county was well represented,
and Clackamas was there in the
person of Franz Kraxburger,
state president of the R. L. C.
Polk County was represented by
M. H. Parker. A motion prevail-
ed that the officers be unani-
mously re-elected, with the re-
sult as follows—F. S. Olsen,
president; A. M. Kennedy, vice
president; Wm. Emmons, J. M.
Ryan, A. J. Miltenberger, exec-
utive committee; W. H. Boyd,
secretary and treasurer; Kessler,
of Banks, Vic Emmons, of Bea-
verton, and H. Creekbaum, of
Cornelius, committee on finance.
The afternoon was enjoyed with
sports, games and music.
"Where the River Shannon
Flows," was nicely executed by
the Irish member, John Ryan,
and Fred Olsen rendered a bass
solo, "Everybody's Doing It."
The meeting dispersed at six
o'clock in the evening, after
thanking W. H. Boyd for ar-
ranging for a successful day.
The refreshments were fine, and
all had a splendid time.

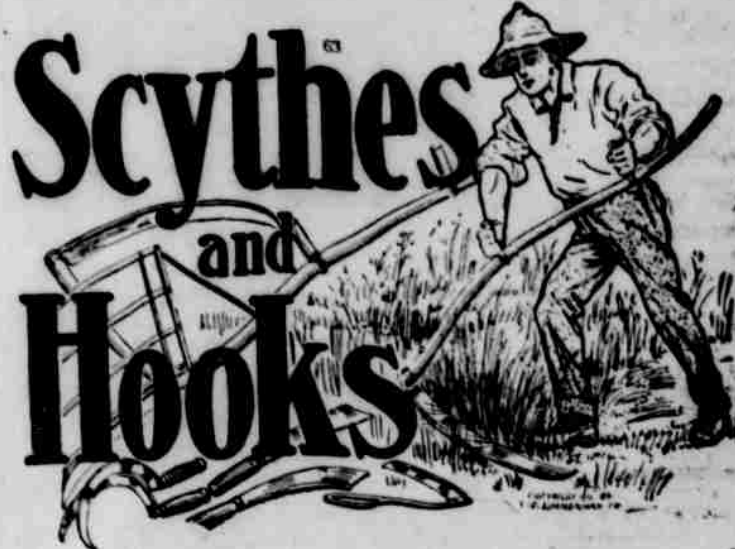
