NEW LIQUOR LAW HAS STRINGENT PROVISIONS

Says You Can't "Give" Liquors Away Outside Incorporated Towns

DOES THIS MEAN WHAT IT SAYS?

If So, and You Live Outside, You Can't Extend Any "Hospitality"

A new law, now going into effect, if sustained and followed out to the letter, is wide-reaching in its consequences. For instance, if you live in the country you can not, at your own table, extend the hospitality of a glass of wine or a glass of beer, or any other intoxicating liquor...

The law doesn't say that a man who makes a little wine in his own vineyard can't give it to members of his family, but if ownership is vested in "Dad," he will take chances if he gives his wife a drink of wine, to say nothing of being debarred from giving it to any other member of the household, or a neighbor.

The law relating to this phase of the question is:

"No person shall be permitted to sell, give, or in any manner dispose of any spirituous, malt, vinous liquors, near beer, or fermented cider, commonly known as hard cider, in this State, outside of the limits of any incorporated city or town, etc."

The penalty is not less than \$250 nor more than \$500 of a fine, or not less than 60 days nor more than 6 months in jail, or both fine and imprisonment can be imposed.

Just what this law will do to picnics where beer is dispensed is not clear, and yet if the letter of the law is followed it will even do away with that feature.

Prosecuting officers will not commit themselves as to what they will do in case complaint shall be made against a farmer extending the courtesy of a glass of wine or beer from a standpoint of strict hospitality to a guest—and there you are. The Argus gives this law as a matter of information, only. As a matter of fact no person outside of an incorporated town can "sell" or "give" with the intention of evading the law, but the "hospitality" part of the matter is certainly up in the air.

So if you are going fishing, and are in the habit of taking bait, your entire party should buy in the prescribed place so all can have access to the supply, without any member of the party being liable. Picnic parties will take notice, also. It is questionable if the "gift" feature from host to guest will stand the test of the courts should an attempt be made to enforce the wording of the statute.

We, the undersigned, qualified electors of Washington County, Oregon, residing within the limits of the territory proposed to be incorporated as the City of Tualatin, as hereinafter specifically set out and described, would respectfully represent to your honorable court as follows, to-wit:

FIRST—That your undersigned petitioners, constituting more than forty persons and all qualified electors of Washington County, Oregon, and are bona fide residents within the limits of the territory proposed to be incorporated as the City of Tualatin, and have resided within the boundaries of said proposed municipal corporation for more than thirty days next preceding the date of this petition.

SECOND—That your petitioners and other residents of the unincorporated village known as Tualatin and the territory hereinafter particularly described, are desirous of having an election held within said limits for the purpose of incorporating said City of Tualatin.

THIRD—That the boundaries and limits of the territory herein proposed to be incorporated as the City of Tualatin are particularly bounded and described as follows, all that portion of Washington County, Oregon, lying and being within and described as follows:

Commencing at the northwest corner of lot No. 22 in Tualatin Gardens, as shown on the duly recorded map and plat thereof, on file and record in the office of the County Recorder of Washington County, Oregon, said point being 1000 chs. north of the southeast corner of section 22, T. 2 S. R. 3 W. W. M., running thence west on the N. line of Lots No. 22 and 24 of said Tualatin Gardens a distance of 1010 feet, more or less to a point due south of the W. line of Fifth Street, in the town of Tualatin, Oregon, as shown on the duly recorded map and plat thereof, on file and record in the office of the County Recorder of Washington County, Oregon; thence N. parallel with the E. line of said section 22, thence E. on said section line 1010 feet, more or less, to the N. E. corner thereof; thence continuing E. on N. line of section 22, to the N. E. corner of the lot or less, to the center of the Tualatin River; thence down the center of said river in a general southeasterly direction to a point where the said center line intersects a line 50 rods west of the Willamette Meridian, in the N.
