Asks Sheriff Reeves to Accept Money on Tax or Show Cause

Company Does Not Want to Pay Special Road Tax, \$2.185.04

more explicit, the tax agent of the Southern Pacific Company, has sued out a writ of mandamus 20 15. asking the circuit court to cause I. E. Reeves, sheriff and tax collector, to accept \$18,755.06 as tax money for the 1912 assessment on road bed, rolling stock and depot grounds, or show cause why he will not so do, in court, June 16. This sum is the tax nor is it mentioned in any respect, but this is the bone of

Their tax agent offered the tax counter a draft for the above sum on March 14, just a day be-fore the rebate closed. Sheriff Reeves was collecting the special tax from all others, and refused to take the proffered check unless so instructed by the county court. He notified the court, but his answer was that he was the tax collector, Reeves decided that he would not make fish or one and flesh of the other and turned down the tender.
