TIME FOR SPRAYING ON HAND, SAYS LEIS

Beaverton Orchardist Writes to
Argus Readers

SPRAY NOW FOR THE CODLING MOTH

The Only Way to Get Good Fruit is to
Exercise Care

Editor Argus: The time for the next spraying for worms, or codling moth, is with us again and for the benefit of those interested, I will let them know how they can raise good, clean fruit and get the highest price for it. Our fruit inspector, H. C. Atwell, says we can raise the best apples in the world. True, and while so, it is not news to me. I have had that idea, and expressed it for years, and know it is not an exaggeration—but are we doing it? I know that there are many orchards in Washington County and the Willamette Valley that should produce good fruit, if properly cared for, but many at the best produce a poor quality of food for hogs, just because the trees and fruit do not have proper care, and lack in spraying. It is a pity that all our orchardists do not know that it is to their interest, as well as to the interest of their neighbors who are trying to raise good fruit, to spray in season. It is impossible to keep your own orchard clean without proper spraying, and when you fail to spray, your neglect affects the neighbor who is trying to grow fruit that will stand the market tests. Many times a grower will refuse to spray and at the same time hold up his hands if a tuberculous cow or a cross dog is running at large. They will tell you in these instances that the law is violated—but how about this? There is a statute that was not we know of a county fruit inspector will warrant he has his hands more than full all the time.

Now it is impossible to raise clean fruit without spraying. That time is past, many years ago. I notice that Inspector Atwell gives me credit for having one of the cleanest, if not the cleanest, orchards in the Willamette Valley, and so I have. I did not get this result by looking at it. It took study and work, and every one can do the same if all would take an interest.

Now is the proper time to spray for worms. Select a clear day, and be sure your trees and foliage are dry or otherwise the spray will not adhere. If the foliage be dry rain will not wash off the spray. The object of spraying at this time is to cover the apple and foliage with the poison. For this spraying I use 24 pounds of the Grasse brand, Arsenate of lead, as I find it the best brand to use—having tried many, and this gives me the best satisfaction. I know it to be the best neutral arsenate in the market, and it will be money in your pocket at harvest time. Add to this 14 gallons of lime and sulphur solution to fifty gallons of water. I am using the Aetna brand of lime and sulphur, which I guarantee to be the best on the market. (In my last letter through some mistake I read 24 gallons of lime and sulphur solution to 50 gallons of water—this should read 14 gallons.) One and one-half gallons is sufficient if the Aetna is used, and if stronger, it might burn the foliage. Do not use an acid arsenate of lead as it will not combine with the lime and sulphur solution. Use the best, and you will not sacrifice your crop and lose many dollars. For this spraying use a Vermorel nozzle or one that will throw a misty spray. The Bordeaux spray is too coarse for this spraying, and will not cover as much surface.

Watch your young trees at the time for the woolly and green aphids, as well as the brown aphids, as they are very hard on young trees, as the leaves curl and in many instances they will defoliate them, and stunt them to the extent of the season's growth. For all the aphids I use the Black Leaf 40, and find it the best, and superior to the coal oil emulsion. It can be reduced 1 to 500 gallons. You can add it to your spray when spraying for the worms. It can be purchased at any seed store, I think. If not, I can supply you.

Your last spraying for the second brood of Codling moths will be due in the last of August.
