THOS. ROBINSON MEETS DEATH AT GARDEN HOME

Brakesman on Oregon Electric Limited Falls From Platform
TRAIN GOING 30 MILES PER HOUR
Head Crushed Into Unrecognizable Mass and Arm cut Off

Thomas Robinson, brakesman, aged 23 years, was instantly killed at the Garden Home station, Saturday evening, about 5:30. The Limited for Eugene, was running past the station at from 30 to 35 miles per hour, and Robinson went to the platform to throw off a check register. He was witnessed by only Mr. and Mrs. Parnell, of Hillsboro, who were returning from Salem from the Fair, and was standing on the platform when the train rushed by. Neither saw him fall, but Mrs. Parnell says she thought she saw him take the fatal tumble. Robinson was dragged some 30 or 40 feet, and when his body was found it was badly mangled, and one of his arms was severed at the wrist. He had evidently been hanging to a door-trip rod, as the piece of metal was found near the scene of the accident. The rod was attached to the wall with 4 screws, which penetrated the wood about 3/8 of an inch. The rod was broken at the bottom, near where it acted as a plunger to trip the swing door.
Conductor Garves did not miss the brakesman until he neared Tualatin, and did not know of the fatality until the dispatcher at Portland called him at Tualatin station and told him.
Young Robinson had been working but a short time, and Conductor Garves said at the inquest, held by Coroner Dr. Barrett, of this city, that he had frequently warned the young man about being careless on the platform. The young man's folks live at Denver, and he has an aunt in Portland, who was present at the inquest.
The Coroner's jury consisted of J. O. Freck, N. L. Woodard, F. I. Webber, J. M. Butler, Geo. Peterson and H. S. Scherner, and their verdict follows:
"We, the jury, impaneled in the above case, do find that Thomas Robinson, brakesman on the Oregon Electric Railway Co., came to his death by falling from an Oregon Electric Railway car at Garden Home, Saturday, July 5, the cause of same being the breaking of the door trip rod, which appears to not have been sufficiently fastened to the car."

HIRAM WHITLOCK

Hiram Whitlock, aged 68 years, died at the home of his brother, Daniel Whitlock, near Farmington, June 27, 1913. Deceased was born at Ithaca, N. Y., Feb. 22, 1845, and resided there until four years ago, when he came to Oregon to live with his brother. His wife and only son died several years ago. Besides the Farmington brother he leaves two brothers and a sister at Ithaca. The funeral was held June 29, Rev. Clarence Reer, of the M. E. Church officiating. Interment was in the Lewis cemetery.

J. Cooper, of Forest Grove, former proprietor of the Hillsboro National Restaurant, was Tuesday acquitted of a charge of selling adulterated milk. The charge was made when Cooper ran the Hillsboro place, and the waiter swore that Cooper had always told her never to weaken milk, and she further testified that it was not weakened, but that it probably lost its test by repeated pouring from the top of the vessel. A state deputy procured the milk and tested it, and it went less than one per cent, according to his analysis. The law says that milk must test 3.2 before it can be served. The verdict of the jury hanged on intent, and Cooper was consequently found not guilty. W. G. Hare appeared as counsel for Cooper. The jury, W. E. McCourt, E. L. McCormick, L. J. Rushlow, J. C.
