PIONEER JOS. GASTON DEAD AT PASADENA

Was Resident of Oregon for Fifty-
One Years—Founder of Gaston

LAST WORK WAS HISTORY OF STATE

Was Prominent in Early Railroad Work
in State of Oregon

Joseph Gaston, Oregon pioneer, early railroad builder, and historian, passed away at Pasadena, Sunday, July 20, 1933, after an illness covering several months. About a month ago, Mr. Gaston moved to Pasadena to make that city his permanent home, his daughter, Miss Mary, accompanying him. Miss Gaston is now critically ill.

Mr. Gaston was 80 years of age, and came to Oregon from Ohio, in 1852. He was the founder of the town of Gaston. Gaston organized the Central Oregon Railway Co., and projected the present West Side line of the Southern Pacific. His company was afterward taken over by Ben Holladay.

Mr. Gaston was active in railroad promotion until 1880, when he settled on a farm at Gaston, Oregon, in Washington county. In 15 years there, he drained Wapatoe Lake and reclaimed 1000 acres of fertile farm land from it. In 1896 he sold his farm and went to Portland to live.

Prior to this, from 1870 to 1875, while he was in the midst of his railroad promotion work, he had done editorial work on the Daily Bulletin. He was also at one time editor and proprietor of the Farmer's Journal, which he him-

self published in Hillsboro.

Of his own political interests, Mr. Gaston in an autobiographical sketch says: "While always taking an interest in politics and public affairs, he has never been an office holder, and only once a candidate for office, being the Populist candidate for the office of Justice of the Supreme Court in 1894; the election resulting in 40,450 votes for the Republican candidate, 26,135 for the Populist candidate, and 18,625 for the Democratic candidate."

"Outside of journalism and contributions to monthly magazines," the sketch of himself concludes, "Mr. Gaston's literary work was limited to 'Portland, Its History and Builders,' a volume of 700 pages and two volumes of biographies of Portland builders, published in 1911, and 'The Centennial History of Oregon,' published in 1912."

Mr. Gaston's wife died in 1898. Besides his daughter, Miss Mary Gaston, Mr. Gaston leaves the following relatives: J. S. Gaston and Douglas Gaston, both nephews; Mrs. Retta G. Clark, his niece, and her daughter, Beatrice; Mrs. J. S. York, a niece, and her son, Ralph L. Patton; the wife of his dead brother, Mrs. S. O. Gaston, all of Portland, and Mrs. Anna G. Patton, a niece, who is with Miss Gaston, in Pasadena.

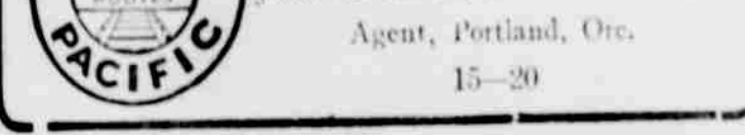
