## WATCH YOUR CAMPS; KEEP DOWN THE FIRES

County Has Much Valuable Timber That Might be Destroyed

### LAWS STRINGENT ON NEGLIGENCE

Pays to be Careful as Timber Pays a Heavy Tax Every Year

As Washington County timber is paying a good round tax it is well that the state has laws that make it imperative that persons camping shall be more than careful of their fires. If you have slashings to burn get your permits from the fire warden or his deputies. As a matter of news the Argus herewith prints the penalties for neglect in the matter of fires:

#### Control of Fires

That any person who wilfully or negligently allows fire to escape from his own lands shall be punished by a fine of not less than fifty dollars nor more than one thousand dollars, or imprisonment for not less than one month nor more than one year.

#### Camp Fires

Any person who leaves a camp fire burning or permits such a fire to spread upon lands within this state not his own shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars nor more than five hundred dollars.

#### Firearms

Any person who uses in any firearms discharged upon lands not his own other than incombustible gun wadding, shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars nor more than five hundred dollars.

#### Forbidden to Set out Fires

Any person who shall unlawfully or maliciously set fire to any woods, forest, timber, brush, or any vegetable matter whatever with the intent that the property of another shall be injured thereby, shall be guilty of a felony, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by imprisonment in the state penitentiary for not less than one nor more than ten years.

#### Burning Permits Required

Any person or persons burning slashings, chopping, woodland or brushland between June 1 and October 1, without a written or printed permit from a regularly appointed fire warden shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$25, nor more than \$500, or ten days to three months imprisonment.

Andreas Thoeny, a cripple—that is to say, he has a congenital short leg along with a congenitally long one—came to the city early Monday morning to surrender himself to the sheriff. He quietly explained that he and Casper Huber conducted a dairy, as partners, down near Firlock, on the Oregon Electric, below Beaverton, and that a brother of his partner worked for the firm, while Thoeny's sister cooked for the firm and help. He said that Ulrich, the brother of the partner, had some words with the sister and this brought about bad feeling between all of them. Last Saturday it came to a focus while Ulrich Huber was making a cow stand around in the barn where they were milking. They finally mixed and the Thoeny boy was too much for the partner's brother, and they finally all mixed up, with the result that Thoeny was like Caesar—"he came, he saw and he conquered," notwithstanding he had a bum leg. He took his laurels modestly, but thought it would be a good idea to have it of record, so he waited patiently until one of the brothers came up and swore to a complaint. He then was assessed \$20, which he paid without a murmur. Judge Smith then lectured the two men, and they finally agreed to forget their troubles, let bygones be bygones, and took the next car to the ranch, agreeing to dwell in peace and amity. The Huber contestant had a pair of "blue eyes," while Andreas had a scalp wound, and, in explaining this, says that he doesn't know whether it came from Huber, or whether he was kicked by a cow.
