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OWNER OF WILD WEST CUT OUT OREGON CITY

Tells Why he Did Not go There on Monday, Instead of Hillsboro

GOV. WEST STOPPED SUNDAY SHOW

Beckmann Says Could Not Show There Monday Without Cancelling Dates

Fred Beckmann, owner of the Oklahoma Ranch Wild West Show did not take his aggregation of riders to Oregon City, Monday, as promised by his representative, Burlock. The show was dated for Oregon City, Sunday, and the ministers of the falls city appealed to Gov. West to stop the show. This was done, although an injunction had been served against Sheriff Maas and other officials stopping them from interfering with the performances. Later it was discovered that the Monday date could not be made without cutting both Hillsboro and Tillamook, so the show came on to this city Sunday afternoon and filled the Washington County date. Mr. Beckmann had the following to say relative to sidetracking Oregon City, when seen at the grounds, Monday evening:

"After our representative at Oregon City had half-agreed to show there today, I found out that if we did so we would not only lose the two performances at Hillsboro, but we should be obliged to cancel Tillamook entirely, or at least cut the afternoon performance. This would have meant a big financial loss."

"We billed Oregon City only after we had ascertained what we thought was a perfect willingness on the part of the officials for a Sunday date. Had our representative known at the time what agreeing to show at Oregon City would have meant to us he would not have made the proposition. To be concise, we had either to break with Oregon City today or break faith with Hillsboro and Tillamook, and we chose the least of the two evils. Oregon City is a good little town and has a lot of workmen there who can ill afford to lose a day for amusement, and we therefore billed the city for Sunday, not thinking we would stir up trouble and expense."
