### OREGON OLD SETTLER DIES

James Franklin Pierce, one of the early settlers of Washington county, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. John Ireland, of Forest Grove, Saturday, August 9, 1913, aged 82. He had been a resident of Washington county for more than 60 years.

Mr. Pierce was born at Taunton, Mass. He came to Oregon by ox team from Peoria, Ill., in 1852. Settling in Washington county, he acquired a donation land claim of 160 acres near Greenville, and until 1874 actively followed farming. At that time he embarked in the general merchandise business at Greenville, receiving a commission as postmaster the same year, an office he retained for 17 years, when he resigned, sold his business and removed to Forest Grove, where he had since resided.

Mr. Pierce, in 1859, married Miss E. A. McNamer. Five children survive. They are: Mrs. Mary Vollum, Mrs. Elsie Dashiel, C. W. Pierce, of the Portland Fire Department, all of Portland; Mrs. Alice Thomas, of Milwaukee, and Mrs. Clarissa Ireland, of Forest Grove.
