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HEAVY FROST KILLS VEGETATION SUNDAY

Mountain Territory, However, Free From Freeze

RAIN FALLS DURING SUNDAY NIGHT

Moisture Debars From Finishing Threshing of Clover Seed

Sunday night the Tualatin Plains section was visited by the first real blighting frost of the autumn season, and potato and tomato vines, that had formerly been "nipped just the least bit" went the way of all flesh and lay wilted by noon. The freeze was general all over the lower lands, while up in the mountain districts just the tops of potato vines were touched, and in some places there was no evidence of frost.

Rain started during the night, Sunday, and by morning real Oregon mist was in evidence. This means, of course, that a few who had clover ready to thresh will be delayed, and many may not realize on this attractive bit of income, at all.

The good weather, however, held until nearly all had been provided with a good harvest, with no loss to speak of by rains or frost—and even those who lose on clover threshing are not complaining.

STATE ELECTION MEASURES

The following election measures will be voted on, for sustaining or repealing acts of the last legislature: State University Repair Fund. Yes or no. University of Oregon new Building Appropriation, yes or no.

Sterilization Act, yes or no. County Attorney Act—this law affects Washington County, in particular, as sustaining it will give this county a district attorney by itself, instead of making it a judicial district affair.

Workingman's Compensation Act. The election will be held Nov. 4—on the first Tuesday in Nov. If the county attorney bill passes the county will pay \$2,100 per annum to a local district attorney.

TUALATIN RESIDENT ASKS INJUNCTION

Wants Nyberg Quarry Enjoined From Shooting and Blasting

SAYS IN DANGER ALL THE TIME

North Plains Woman Sues Husband For Separation—Spicy Complaint

Henry Saffron, a resident of Tualatin, has sued out a complaint in circuit court asking for an injunction against the operation of the rock quarry on the John Nyberg place. Saffron has some land adjoining, and he says he is in fear of his life, and that the blasting throws rock over on his buildings, and that he cannot, under the circumstances, have free going and coming over his place. A Portland firm has appeared as Saffron's attorneys.

The quarry has been used for getting rock for the macadam roads, and the case was once before in court.

Ida B. Duke, who was married in Hillsboro in 1911, has sued J. H. Duke for divorce. She alleges she let her husband have \$950 shortly after marriage, to put in a brickyard at North Plains, and she alleges that besides taking care of the household work she has had to mingle with the men in doing men's work. She also alleges that Duke has taken but two baths since they were married, and that she does not longer wish to tolerate him, as he changes his clothes but once each month. According to her prayer, Duke has told her that he "would fire the house;" that she "would go up in smoke, sometime," and that he "would get the bunch," meaning herself, relatives and friends, and she wants a decree giving her back her maiden name.
