CITY TO APPOINT ELECTION OFFICERS

City of Hillsboro Must Also Print Ballots and Tell Results

Your of the 23d instant relative to Section 4922 of Lord's Oregon Laws received and has our consideration.

Receipts for the week have been cattle, 1788; calves, 57; hogs, 5347; sheep, 2558.

Generally the mutton and lamb markets are steady to firm.

During the past quarter 150 permits for the appropriation of water have been issued by the State Engineer, of which number 11 are for the construction of reservoirs. According to these permits it is proposed to irrigate 18,620 acres, develop 21,716 horsepower, as well as for municipal and domestic purposes.
